KETTERING v BURTON WANDERERS – This tie was played at Kettering on Saturday in miserable weather, and before a poor attendance. Kettering were the first to score, Panter putting through with a low shot, but Arkesden shortly afterwards equalised. Kettering again got the lead early in the second half by Panter. Owing to the match starting late it was impossible to finish, and the referee stopped the game five minutes before time. Result: Kettering 2 goals, Burton 1.

KETTERING v. BURTON WANDERERS
DARKNESS STOPS PLAY.

For the fourth Saturday in succession the Burton Wanderers were again engaged out of town, and early on Saturday made the journey to Kettering to play the town club in the first round of the Kettering Charity Cup. As we have previously stated, the draw was in favour of the Wanderers and should have taken place on the Gurn ground, but the financial condition of the club almost compelled the committee to sell their right to Kettering and play the tie away from home. In the League engagements with the Northamptonshire club the Wanderers have lost three points and gained one, being defeated at Kettering by 4 goals to 0, while at Burton the game resulted in a draw, no goals being registered. The committee decided to make one alteration in their usual team, Goodman taking the place of King as right half-back, but this was done to give Goodman a trial, and not because any fault could be found with King's play. The alteration, therefore, made the whole of the team Burton youths. Mr. Kingscott, of Derby, was the referee, and he lined the men up at 2 30 in the following order:—

Wanderers — Taft (goal), Wain, Haywood (backs), Goodman, Smith, Wildin (half-backs), Sellars, Richards, Appleby, Arkesden, Dyke (forwards).

KETTERING CHARITY CUP.

LOUGHBOROUGH v. ROTHWELL TOWN SWIFTS.

This tie in the first round of the Kettering Cup was played at Loughborough before a rather poor gate. The weather was inclined to be foggy. Rothwell are at the top of the Northants. League, and recently wiped Mansfield out of the English Cup at Mansfield. Both clubs were well represented, but the odds were all in favour of Loughborough. Walker was omitted from the home ranks, Smith stepping up into the forward line. Teams:—

Loughborough.—Beardsley, goal; Hardy and Bailey, backs; Mumford, Hodgkin, and White, half-backs; Roulston, Smith, Pegg, Brailsford, and Pike, forwards.

Rothwell.—Brampton, goal; Phillips and Panter, backs; Willis, Shortland, and Mableston, half-backs; Coulson, Rowlett, Lawrence, Gibson, and Robinson, forwards.

Referee, Mr. West, of Kettering.

Pegg started, and Roulston at once got away and centred. Brailsford gave to Pegg, who was given off-side just as he shot into the custodian's hands. Loughborough pressed further, and Brailsford and Pike made a couple of good runs. Pegg next got through the backs in fine form, but spoilt the effort by a wretchedly weak kick when a goal seemed certain. By means of a big kick the Swifts got into the home half, but kicked wide, and Pike speedily transferred. Brampton fisted a shot from Mumford, and Pike returned the leather to the centre for Roulston to miss the mark. Brampton fisted another long shot, and then the Swifts got down again, but without result. Roulston got away with the goal kick, and placed the leather well in goal.

Brampton fisted, and Brailsford badly missed the opportunity to give a sharp return. Pike caused the custodian to handle again, and the latter also conceded a corner to Smith, but without result. As a variation, Beardsley then had a long shot from one of the halves to negotiate. The Swifts' forwards were very fast, and, with the aid of big kicks from their backs, several times got down near the Loughborough goal, Lawrence just missing on one occasion from Coulson's centre. Pegg was going through when Phillips fouled him. The free kick was of no use, but Loughborough scored a good goal, which was wrongfully disallowed, as Pike, against whom the decision was given, was easily behind the ball when Roulston kicked across the goal mouth. Pegg, however, did the business immediately after with a daisy-cutter into the corner of the net, after 25 minutes' play. Rothwell had another look in, and Mableston all but scored with a high shot in the top corner. Beardsley saved cleverly at the expense of a corner, which was well placed, Gibson kicking over. Loughborough resumed hostilities, and Roulston with a good shot just missed. Pike took a flag kick, but the Swifts got it away, and a good centre from Roulston was put behind. The Swifts' defence proved very solid and the home shooting very unreliable. Brampton kicked away a good shot from White, and Pike returned over the bar. At the other end Mumford gave a corner, and Mableston made another good try to score, but found Beardsley on the alert. Half-time:—Loughborough, one; Rothwell, none. After a short interval the game was resumed in a rapidly gathering fog. Loughborough at once set to work, and Brampton stopped a header from White, and later ran out and fisted a shot from Mumford. Brailsford had an excellent opening, but Brampton saved the return struck the ground in

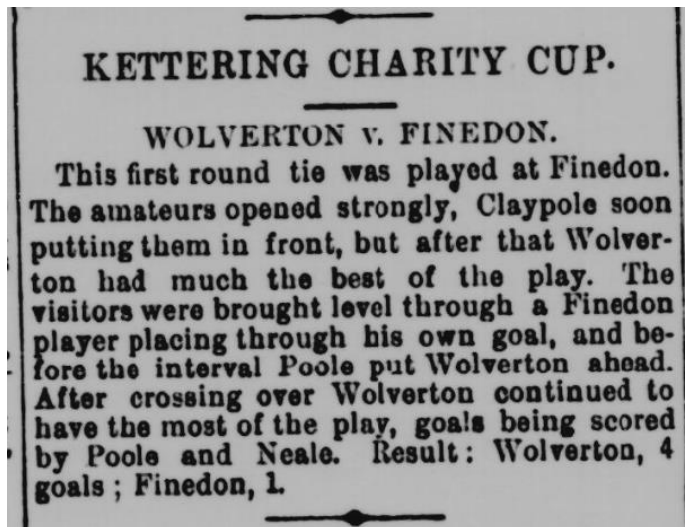
at cross quarters, and the second front of goal and bounced on to the net. The second half progressed much as the first had done, almost entirely in favour of the home side, who, however, still exhibited that lamentable incapacity in front of goal. Smith and Pike made a couple of good shots, but both went wide. Pantar allowed a corner, from which a scrimmage ensued, and Brampton again prevented disaster to his side. The Swifts' right wing got down and all but scored on one occasion, but their visits were few and far between. Loughborough gained another corner, which was placed by Pike. The "reds" got it away, but Loughborough came back again strongly, and after a clever bit of work by Pike, who dodged three men, Pegg applied the necessary impetus at short range, and gave Loughborough another goal. Shortly after Brampton was again called upon by Pegg. In a scrimmage Pike found the net, but as he was standing right under the bar the referee very rightly blew his whistle for off-side. Brampton next lifted a flag-kick of Boulton's, and soon after a good shot from Pike. Lawrence had an opening for the Swifts, but kicked wide. The fog was now becoming so dense that the ball was scarcely visible to the spectators on the opposite side of the field. Loughborough attacked almost continuously, and several good chances were thrown away. Pike did some good work on the left wing, and once struck the outside of the net. Loughborough had a couple of corners and a free without result. Pike missed another easy chance, and White also kicked wide from easy range. At length Brinkford received a pass from Pegg, and running between the backs scored with the best shot of the day, which struck the under part of the netting. Result:—

#7 KETTERING v WOLVERTON - Splendid weather favoured the meeting of these teams at Kettering, and a goodly number of spectators witnessed the match. Winning the toss Wolverton played with the sun behind them, but Kettering soon placed their opponents on the defensive. Dixon played the ball nicely in front of goal, and it was rushed through, whilst a mis-kick by Moss gave Miler the opportunity of adding a second for Kettering before half-time. Twenty minutes after changing ends Miller put on another point, and nothing further being scored, Kettering qualified for the final by three goals to none.

#8 RE-PLAYED SEMI-FINAL LOUGHBOROUGH v RUSHDEN

These teams met at Kettering on Monday to replay the semi-final in the Kettering Charity Cup Competition, the first meeting some few weeks ago ending in a draw of no goals. Loughborough played the same eleven that drew with Newton Heath on Saturday and set out for Kettering on the 1.30 train. The weather was glorious, but the attendance fell far short of that obtained when the teams last met. Mr. Kingscott, of Derby, was the referee, and the teams lined up as follows:

Rushden: Baldrey, Attley and Lilley; Clarke, Bailey, and Dunkley; Groves, Sale, Young, Beddingfield and Bamford.

Loughborough: Beardsley; Ward and Hardy; Smith, Hodgkin and White; Hall, Roulstone, Pegg, Tuthill, and Wright.

Hardy won the toss, and decided to kick downhill with the wind, but in face of the sun Rushden at once made for the Loughborough goal, Beardsley saving in the first minute. Then Loughborough had the game well in hand for some time. Rushden being almost wholly on the defensive. The peculiar shape of the ground baffled the Loughborough players who shot much too high. Baldrey was called upon several times, but the Loughborough forwards were far from being together, indeed Wright and Tuthill were frequently coming into collision with one another. A free gave Rusden an opportunity of getting away, and through a misunderstanding between the backs and goalkeeper they all but scored, Beardsley only just clearing. Baldrey next saved from Roulstone, and again Loughborough confined play wholly to the Rushden portion for a considerable period, but they were utterly unable to pierce the defence. Once, however, Clarke dashed in and cleared as the ball was about to roll into the goal. The game was not over-exciting, neither side, with the exception of the backs, doing anything of importance. As the interval advanced Loughborough strove hard, but could not get through, and Beddingfield, when offside gained possession and raced away. Loughborough's appeal being disregarded. The Rushden player was the only one that kept playing, and he went clear ahead, but shot wide. Shortly after Beardsley saved capitally and half-time arrived with no score.

Resuming, Rushden, with the slope and wind, had much more of the game, but the Loughborough defence played well, especially Beardsley. Play opened out, and Loughborough had a large number of frees but failed to utilise them. Peg gave Baldrey a warm shot, but the Loughborough forwards played a most disappointing game. Hall and Roulstone being the only two of any real service. Rushden played up determinedly, and several times looked like scoring, but Loughborough got away, and had a chance of scoring from a free, but let it slip, and just when it appeared that another drawn game would result a free was given against Titch and the ball cannoned into goal off Ward. There were only eight minutes left to play, and with Rushden playing the stronger game all hope of Loughborough making a draw had vanished. Rushden pressed hard, and a minute from time they secured a corner, which was well placed by Bamford and Beardsley fisted away. Clarke however, headed back again and found the net, the whistle sounding for time when the ball had been placed in the centre, the result being

RUSHDEN, two goals;

LOUGHBOROUGH, none.

This was a keen disappointment to the Loughborough Club, who, however, did not deserve to win. Wright and Tuthill played an indifferent game, and Pegg was rather slow, Rushden were much quicker on the ball, and did not lose many opportunities of shooting at goal. Beardsley saved grandly on several occasions or a bigger score would have been run up. At half-back Hodgkin played a fine game for Loughborough, and the defence of Rushden was also very good.
