The 25 teams were divided into four divisions.

Leicestershire were represented by Leicester Fosse and Shepshed.

Leicester Fosse were in Division 3 along with all the Northamptonshire teams – Finedon Revellers, Kettering Hawks, Kettering Town, Irlingborough and Wellingborough.

Shepshed were in Division 3 with Newark and three teams from Lincolnshire.

Finedon knocked out Leicester Fosse in R1 after playing much of the game with 10 men after Atter had to leave the field injured.

Considerable satisfaction was expressed at Shepshed when it became known by telegraph on Saturday evening that Shepshed FC had successfully lowered the colours of Grantham Town in the first round. This was the second year that Shepshed had entered the Kettering, but owing to a lack of enthusiasm last year "consequent upon the action of the Leicestershire Football Association the previous year "they were knocked out in the first round – by arch rivals – Leicester Fosse. In the second round Shepshed travelled again to Lincolnshire where they were humiliated 17-1 by Grantham Rovers, the eventual winners of the trophy.

Out of the proceeds of the gate money in the 1890-91 semi-final and final ties, after paying all management expenses and placing £30 to a reserve fund for the purchase of a new cup when necessary, the cost of medal for winners and runners-up (£14), expenses of teams (£15) and teas for ditto (£12), paid £50 to the Northampton General Infirmary and £50 to the Kettering Dispensary. This left a balance in the bank of over £60.

GRANTHAM TOWN v SHEPSHED. —Kettering Charity Cup: First Round —These clubs met in the first round above competition on the London-road ground, Grantham, on Saturday. In the first half the home team had the best matters, and at the interval by two goals to one. In the second portion of the game, however, they fell away, and allowed their opponents score twice, and Shepshed won most unexpectedly three goals to two. Teams: Grantham: Broadbent (goal). FOSSE v FINEDON - The Fosse sent a team to Finedon to play in the first round of the Kettering Charity Cup competition. The game was started at three o'clock, when the Finedon men at once forced the game, hard kicking and rushing being their chief tactics, the Fosse forwards being quite outplayed regards any combination. Atter had a splendid run up, but was severely charged and laid low, being of no more service to his side. Up to half-time neither side had scored, the Fates backs having all their work cat oat to repel the repeated long shots pot in by the Finedon backs and half-backs. The Finedon team now scored the first goal

from a long shot rushed through by the forwards, Walker leaving his charge. The game was still minus any combination on either side, long kicking and charging being conspicuous Captain Johnson now had to lay level, being charged in the wind. The game was very exciting, the Fosse having hard lines in not scoring, but the forwards were lost with hard kicking, Flint and Murdoch's absence being very much to the disadvantage of the team. It was quite a holiday at Finedon, all business being suspended for the match. Finedon thus won a hard game, the Fosse being losers by one goal to nothing. Fosse: C. Walker, goal; S. Rowson and W. GRANTHAM ROVERS v. SHEPSHED. Yesterday afternoon, the Grantham Rovers met in the Kettering Cup Competition, the match coming off on the Harlaxton-road ground. There was a very good muster of spectators, and on this score it is a pity the Rovers had not more worthy opponents. On November 15th, Shepshed met the Grantham Town FC the same competition, and, to everyone's surprise, Shepshed went back the winners. Whether they came under the impression that they were going repeat the performance at the Rovers' expense is not clear, but certain it is that they met with little surprise, for when the whistle blew the call of time, the score (which had to kept somewhat cricket-like) was 17 goals to 1 in favour of the home team. The scoring for the Rovers was done by Flinders (5), L. Freeman (5), Salew (4), Cockman and Southwell, and one of the Shepshed players was kind enough to give them one. The game was never exciting, but there was what the spectators evidently appreciated—fun. 
THE KETTERING CHARITY CUP

Last evening they returned home from Kettering about 11 o'clock, after having beaten Rushden in the final by two goals to one. The team was met at the station by the Borough Band, and headed by a torchlight procession, they


were drawn in a waggon decorated with flags for the occasion their club house, the Blue Man Inn. On arriving there the cup was filled several times, and congratulatory speeches were made, and the hope was expressed that the Rovers might win the cup next season, that it would then be their own property.
