## **Match Reports**

THIS DAY'S FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION. THURSDAY LEAGUE. BANKS v. CHEVIOT. Played on the Victoria Park, in the presence of a large and appreciative company. The turf was crisp with frost, without being dangerously hard, and the players bounded over it in capital style. Both clubs were well represented, and an even game was wit-nessed. With the wind behind them in the first half, the Banks scored two goals by the aid of Tyler and Wood, and until a late stage of the game they seemed exceedingly likely to win, for a goal for the Cheviot from the foot of B. Turner was the only reply made until within a few minutes of time, when the referee, Mr. Ashmole, awarded the Cheviot a free kick, and from it the ball was rushed through the Banks' goal by Harris. "Time" was called directly afterwards, with the match ending in A DRAW, two goals each. THURSDAY VICTORIA . MILITARY DEPOT. Played on the Victoria Park. A goodly number of people assembled to cheer the "Royal Bengal Tigers" on to a victory which they could scarcely be expected to secure; but the unexpected hap-pened, for the soldiers, playing with the wind in the pened, for the soldiers, playing with the wind in the first half, scored by means of a goal from Thorburn, and although the Victoria pressed heavily for nearly the whole of the second half, they could not get the ball through, thus losing a match which they had confidently reckoned on winning. J. Atter, who on Wednesday played for Middlesex against Surrey, appeared on the Victoria side, but he had no chances, being "starved" rather than "fed" nearly the whole of the time. Mr. Bessford refereed. Result: MILLITARY DEPOT, one goal; .VICTORIA, none.

#### Additional Information

FORMATION OF A THURSDAY FOOTBALL LEAGUE. A meeting of representatives of the various Thursday Association football clubs in the town and county, convened by Mr. Smithson, of the Postoffice, was held on Thursday evening, at the White Swan Hotel, Market-place, for the purpose of forming a league of local clubs playing on Thursdays, Mr. T. S. Ashmole, of the Thursday Victoria, was voted to the chair, and there were also present Messrs. J. Hall and Whyman (Banks), Smithson and Geeson (Post-office), Deacon (Cheviot), King and Harrison (Thursday Victoria), and Corporal Thorburn and Sergeant Clover (Military Depot). A telegram was received from the Hinckley Clab, practically indicating that they were in favour of the proposal, and it was stated that the Y.M.C.A. were also favourable, but were doubtful of being able to raise a Thursday team. In the course of the discussion evoked by the proposal, a general feeling was evinced in favour of a league rather than an ordinary cup competition, and it was thought also that there were sufficient good clubs in the county to form a compact and well-balanced league. The chairman pointed out, too, that according to Mr. Cleggs motion adopted by the English Association all clubs would in future be obliged to belong to the Football Association or some organisation affiliated to it, or incur the usual penalties, and that, he took it, was a strong argument in favour of the formation of the body.-Corporal Thornburn proposed, and Mr. Geeson seconded, that a league be formed, and it was further decided, on the motion of Mr. Hall, seconded by Mr. Deacon, that it should consist of not less than eight or more than ten clubs. It was named the "Leicestershire Thursday League," and it was further decided, on the motion of Mr. Hall, seconded by Mr. Deacon, that it should consist of not less than eight or more than ten clubs. It was named the "Leicestershire Thursday League," and a sub-committee composed of Messrs. Ashmole, Smithson, and Hall was appointed to draw up a code of rules to be submitted to a future meeting.—Mr. Ashmole was elected chairman of the league, Mr. Smithson secretary, and Mr. Hall treasurer.—It was agreed as a suggestion to the sub-committee that the subscription should be half a guines, and other minor matters were also discussed.
