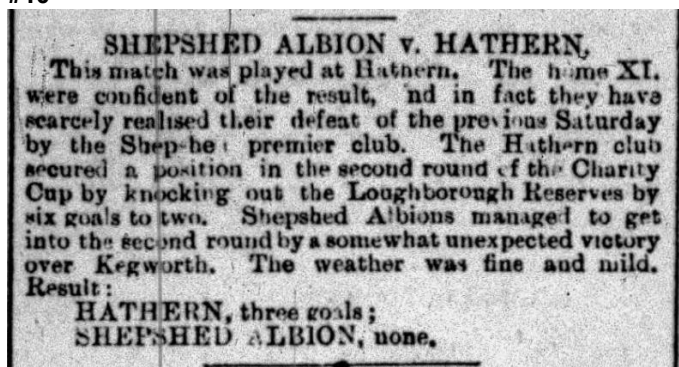

### **#11-13 LOUGHBOROUGH CHARITY CUP**

The second round took place on Saturday, but only three of the four matches were played.

Barrow Rising Star ran clearly away with Rothley, whom they beat by nine goals to none, but the other two matches were closely contested.

Quorn had to go all the way to beat the Peter's at Mountsorrel, and so did the Emmanuel against the White Cross, from Whitwick.

The gate at Mountsorrel was a very gratifying one, the percentage for the charity amounting to 6s 6d. at Loughborough, however, the gate was spoiled though the Town club being at home. The Cup was on exhibition on the ground, and a collection on behalf of the charity realised 6s 9½d, while the referee Mr. Beale also returned his fee, the total proceeds from this match being 12s 3½d.

The re-played matches in the first round between Hathern and Kegworth, on the formers ground, again drew a large gate, some £3 being taken. Kegworth played some further "dark horses" and there are rumours of a further protest. The defeat of Hathern came as a surprise, and it seems as though they cannot get the better of their neighbours. On Saturday, however they were handicapped through having a "passenger" nearly all the game.

Unless there is a protest, Loughborough Corinthians will play Kegworth in the second round at Loughborough, on January 7<sup>th</sup>. *Melton Mowbray Mercury and Oakham and Uppingham News - 15 December 1899*

### **#12 SHEPshed TOWN v WHITWICK WHITE CROSS**

At Shepshed, Shepshed won the toss, and defended Butt Hold end. The Reds pressed but later Whitwick gained a corner, and rushed the ball through. The Reds played grandly, Moore equalizing amid excitement. Result:

### **#14 RE-PLAYED TIE**

#### **WHITWICK WHITE CROSS v SHEPshed TOWN**

These teams met in the re-played tie at Whitwick. At the previous meeting, at Shepshed, the White Cross were severely handicapped by the absence of three of their regular forwards. However, the victory on Saturday was a most decisive one for the White Cross. Shepshed opened strongly, and for the first 20 minutes or so had the best of the game. Then a fine run down enabled Allen to score. Thereafter, with the exception of a few efforts, Shepshed were nowhere. Half-time came with the White Cross leading by four goals to none. Twice Shepshed broke away in the second half, and scored. This woke up the Cross who rapidly put on three more goals, and the game ended in a hollow victory for them by seven gained to two. *Melton Mowbray Mercury and Oakham and Uppingham News - 25 January 1900*

**#18 LOUGHBOROUGH CHARITY CUP  
SEMI-FINAL**

**WHITWICK WHITE CROSS v HATHERN**

Played on the Nottingham-road Ground, Loughborough. Hathern kicked off, and Thompson soon scored. A return was made to the other end, and Whitwick got off-side goal. Give-and-take play ensued until Middleton equalised. An abortive corner was conceded Whitwick, from which Hathern broke away. White Cross returned, and from a centre from the left wing Allan put his side ahead. Hathern tried hard to draw level, but all their efforts were in vain. Interval: Whitwick, two goals; Hathern, one goal.

FINAL**

**WHITWICK WHITECROSS v QUORN HAVELOCK**

These teams met on the Athletic Grounds. Loughborough before a good crowd, but the attendance was not as large last year, this probably being due to the fact that no Loughborough team was contesting. Quorn Havelock reached the final year and were hoping to carry off the cup again this year. Whitwick, on the other hand, had such an excellent record, that it was felt their chances of success were the best. Quorn were not strongly represented as last year, Davis their centre half, being a noticeable absentee. On the Whitwick aide the goalkeeper was away with a broken leg.

The weather was much too hot for football. Quorn, as last year, lost the toss, and had to face the sun and a light breeze. The Mayor of Loughborough (Councillor T. Mayo) kicked off for Quorn, and despite the atmospherical conditions, the game was spiritedly contested. For ten minutes the game was most evenly balanced. Whitwick's forwards made spirited rushes and after a quarter of hour's play Middleton darted off and opened the scoring for the White Cross. Immediately after Quorn were unfortunate in not equalising. The Cross goalkeeper saved a drooping shoot with difficulty, but a minute later Quorn would certainly have drawn level had not one of their own players got to the way of a capital shot. The White Cross next came down finely, Middleton heading over, and a stoppage was then caused through an injury to Rue. A number of free kicks were given against Whitwick for jumping, from one which Rue just shot wide. Quorn attacked strongly, but the Whitwick defence frustrated their efforts in commendable fashion, the backs kicking sure and clean. The interval came with Quorn attacking, but with the White Cross leading by a goal to none.

Shortly after the resumption Whitwick increased their score, the ball rebounding off the goalkeeper on to Clamp, off whom it went through the goal. The Havelock did not show on very well for some time after this and were certainly playing a losing game. The White Cross half-backs played splendidly; and kept Quorn well at bay for a long period. The game was suspended several times for repairs, but nothing serious occurred. Whitwick's forwards were very smart and gave the Quorn custodian several shots which he dealt with cleverly, one save in particular being brilliant in the extreme. Thornton, who had been urging his side to rally was rewarded with success in the last few minutes, he scored a grand goal. Prior to this he had made two or three worthy, but unsuccessful efforts, and the game ended in a victory for the White Cross by two goals to one.

That the better team won there was not the least doubt, for Whitwick played a more finished game. Their half-backs were the mainstay of the team. Mr Walter Cockain officiated as referee, and Messrs E. Beeby and W. Johnson as linesmen

At the close the players made for the Grand Stand when Dr. Phelps, in introducing the Mayor (Councillor T. Mayo) briefly referred to the match, and remarked that the rev gentleman who was the leading spirit of the Whitwick Club kindly offered the use of his ground at Whitwick to the Loughborough Club when some of them so disgraced themselves as to have their own ground closed. The Mayor then presented the handsome cup to Allen, the captain of the White Cross team, and congratulated them on their victory. They were the better team, but he hoped Quorn would not be discouraged, although that was the second time they had fought and lost, cheers having been given, a vote of thanks was accorded his Worship, on the motion of Mr J Paget, seconded by the Rev J W A Mackenzie.
