After the failure of the Leicestershire Football League, two Leicestershire clubs based in the north of the county – Coalville Town and Woodville (village located on the Leicestershire/Derbyshire border), joined the newly formed Burton Junior League.

The League formed with 11 members from three counties (Derbyshire, Leicestershire, and Staffordshire): Burton Ivanhoe, Burton Swifts Reserve, Burton Wanderers Reserve, Coalville Town, Gresley Rovers, Gresley Swifts, Newhall, Tamworth, Tutbury Hawthorn, Swadlincote, and Woodville.

All clubs participating in the inaugural Burton Junior League were required to pay subscriptions and deposits by 9 July. Clubs failing to do so would be considered to have withdrawn. On that date all clubs but two – Tutbury Hawthorn and Butron Wanderers Reserve (Burton Casuals) had paid. The League's secretary contacted the Burton Casuals who informed him that they thought the amount of too large and hence were assumed to have left the competition. Tutbury paid their money at a special meeting of the Burton Junior Football League in late August, which was attended by a representative of the Casuals, who was surprised that his cub were no longer members f he league. After some discussion, a vote was taken by ballot in the form of "Yes" and "No" on the question "Shall the Casuals be admitted?", and resulted as follows: Noes 4; Yes, 3. Consequently the Casuals were excluded. The fixtures lists which included the Casuals had already been published and many clubs intimated that they were willing to play the matches arranged as "ordinary" fixtures.

Burton Ivanhoe bore their own expenses as they did not charge admission.

Coalville finished the 16-game league competition in 6th place, winning 7, losing 7 and drawing 2.

Woodville finished bottom with just one victory all season, conceding more than 5 goals per game. Tutbury Hawthorn beat Burton Swifts Reserve 2-1 to win the Burton Junior Cup At an Executive Committee meeting of the League held at the Star hotel, High Street, Burton in February 1893, Redfern [Newhall] was reported for rough play in the Newhall and Swadlincote match. Moon [Swadlincote] was rather severely hurt. After a thorough investigation Newhall were ordered to play their next League match without Newhall. Tamworth Town Swifts withdrawal from the League in late April came as surprise. Having had no intimation whatever of Tamworth's intentions both Tutbury Hawthorn and Gresley Rovers had made arrangements for the visit of Tamworth upon the dates previously agreed. Both clubs made a claim for compensation directly to Tamworth.

Tutbury Hawthorn won the League after fighting tooth and nail with Burton Swift Reserve. They were presented with a Championship Flag.

Gresley Swifts and Woodville were re-elected to the League at the AGM.

Burton St Paul's were admitted to the League for the 1893-94 season.


### **Additional Information**

A meeting of the executive committee of the above organization was held on Tuesday evening, at the Star Hotel, High Street. A player named Redfern (Newhall) was reported for rough play in a recent match between Newhall and Swadiincote, whereby a member of the latter team (Moon) was rather severely burt; but, after taking all circumstances into consideration, it was thought that the case would be met by ordering Newhall to play their next League match without Redfern. The inconvenience occasioned by the practise of many of the League clubs in delaying the nomination of referees until the last day or two was brought before the committee by the Newhall club, and the secretary was instructed to write the clubs, calling their attention to the fact that, according to rule, referees should be nominated fourteen days before the match in which they are to officiate.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

The first annual general meeting of the Burton Junior League was held at the Star Hotel, High Street, on Saturday evening, when Mr. H. McNicol (chairman of the executive) presided over a capital attendance, which included representatives from the whole of the clubs affiliated to that organization. — The first business was the reading of the minutes of the previous general meeting, and these having been duly confirmed the matter of Tamworth Swifts' withdrawal from the League came under consideration. It will be remembered that, having had no intimation whatever that Tamworth intended to sever their connection with the League, both Tutbury and Grealey Rovers made arrangements for the visit of the Tamworth men upon the dates previously fixed, and each club consequently made a claim for compensation. The matter was discussed at the Loague meeting held a month ago, and it was resolved to forward these claims to Tamworth, and, in the event of them not being fairly met, to report the matter fully to the English Association. The latter course had to be taken in the end, but the English Association declined to interfere. It was now decided, therefore, to report the conduct of the Tamworth club to the Birmingham Association, in the hope that that body would take such action as would make it to the interest of the offending club to deal justly with the claims made against it.— In the matter of a deferred match between Coalville and Grealey Swifts, which had been ordered to be played on the same afternoon as one between the former and Newhall, a claim from Coalville for compensation for loss occasioned by the late arrival of the Grealey team was referred

the late arrival of the Grealey team was referred back to the executive for settlement. The next business was the settlement of the composition of the League for next year, and before the various applications for admission were considered, Mr GEORGE RAE (Swifts' Reserve) moved that the number of clubs be increased to twelve.—Mr. R. MANSFIELD (Grealey Swifts) seconded, but, after a brief discussion, an amendment—moved by Mr. JONES (Tutbury) and seconded by Mr. SHARPE (Grealey Rovers)—to the effect that it be limited to ten, was carried by 7 votes to 2.—Grealey Swifts and Woodville, who were the bottom two clubs at the end of the season, had to retire according to rule, and applications for admission had also been received from Burton St. Paul's, Ashby Albion, Burton Britannia, and Burton Casuals. The latter club, however, sent no representative to the meeting.—After a short debate it was unanimously resolved that Grealey Swifts and Woodville be retained in the League, which left but one vacancy for the ensuing season—Representatives from the various new clubs applying for admission—with the exception of the Casuals — were 'neard in support of their applications, and, on the ballot being taken, it was found to be cast unanimously for St. Paul's, Whose delegates were at once called in to assist in the transaction of the remaining items of business—Ou the question of the amendment of rules, Mr. JONES (Tutbury) had given notice of a motion in favour of making the registered fourteen days, or who being registered had played in four suntor matches should be eligible to play for his clubin Junior League games. The time was so far advanced, however, that, with the consent of the mover, the discussion of the motion was adjourned, on the understanding that is shuld take precedence over all other business at the next meeting.—On the proposition of Mr. E.J. OrrzwELL (secretary), seconded by Mr. W. H. Owgs (Tutbury), is was manimously resolved that the hearty thanks of the League be given to Mr. J. R. Horne (late secretary of Burton Swifts, and founder of the League) for his past services, and that his name be forthwith placed upon the list of vice-presidents.—Mr. E. SHARRATT(treasurer)stated that he had written Mr. W. H. Worthington relative to the presidency of the League for the season 1893-4, and had received the following reply from that gentleman, under date May 8th : "Laugham Hotel, London —Mr. E. Sharratt.—Dear sir,— Your letter of the 5th inst. has been forwarded to me here; and in reply I was under the impression that I had answered your former letter. I shall have much pleasure in accepting the presidency of the Burton-on-Trent and District Junior Football League, and am yours truly, W. H. Wortmington." —There was no other business of public interest, and the proceedings were brought to a close with a vote of thanks to the Chairman.
