Match Reports

A selection of published match reports.

LOCAL FOOTBALL. The first rounds of the Hinckley Charity Cup Competition were played on Saturday, eight teams taking part. To the promoters and those interested in the contest, it would appear there were two great surprises, Hinckley (who have held the cup for two years) being beaten by Barrow, and Tamworth Athletic defeating Coalville Town (who have obtained a good reputation in Leicestershire League circles). The latter fixture came off at Tamworth, and a capital game was witnessed. It was a swift game throughout, full of exciting incident, and certainly the best match, from a scientific point of view, yet played this season in the district. The Athletic showed splendid form, and fairly delighted the home spectators. The first half was very even, and at the interval the score was level. Afterwards the Athletic gradually assumed the supremacy, and whilst keeping their opponents well at bay, got through twice. T. Lycett, who appeared on the field for the first time this season, played a splendid game, and was responsible for the first goal seven minutes from the start. He is one of those players who seem to play well without practice. Jeffcote was undoubtedly the pick of the half-backs, and the work of the defence was well carried out by A. Large, and the old reliable F. Lycett. "Chit" Cotterill was not over-worked, but what task he was called upon to perform he did in his usual style. The combination of Coalville was perhaps slightly better than that of the Athletic, but they showed an excessive amount of weakness in

At no time during the game was there the slightest approach to rough play. The referee, Mr. Allkins, of Leicester, performed his work with the utmost importiality, and his decisions were frequently received with applause.

Tamworth Athletic v. Nuneaton Town.—These teams met, in most dreadful weather, on the Athletic enclosure, on Saturday last. The match should have been in connection with the Hinckley Cup, but the referee ruled the weather unsuitable for a cup-tie. The home team played with their backs to the top goal, and soon commenced pressing, Carris having his work cut out to stave off disaster. The homesters scored, through 1 yeett, just before half-time. The latter half of the game was very even, both goal-keepers having plenty to do, although the homesters put more life into their attacks than the visitors. Bird made a magnificent run, and from a fine centre Lycet scored a second goal for his side. The feature of the game was the improved play of the home forwards, Yates and Bird being particularly prominent. Jeffcott played a fine game at half, and Mason, at back, was a favourable acquisition. Coffe saved grandly on several occasions, although his work was nothing near so tough as that of Carris. The wet spoiled really good play, but many a worse game has been witnessed under more favourable circumstances.

When the whistle blew the home team left the field value of the saved goals to 0.

Tamworth looked extremely dangerous from a breakaway, but Underwood saved in time, and the Albion had another spell of attacking. Gourley scored with a splendid shot after halfan-hour's play. Aibton continued to have the best of matters, though Tamworth eventually got away. and Underwood was visited several ..mes. Coalthews, just before half-time, when the score was-Coaiville, two goals; Tamworth, one. Tamworth were first to attack on resuming, but were kept out by good defensive play, and again the Albion pressed, but a stubborn defence kept them out for 20 minutes. Then the Albion netted the ball for the third time from a corner. Tamworth, following this, worked very hard, and put in some good shots, but Underwood Ridgard, and Noon were a trio of defenders not to be besten, and a fast game ended: COALVILLE ALBION, three goals;

TAMWORTH, none.

written If half-a-dozen reports were independent persons about the semi-final match at Barwell on Saturday, when Coalville Albions met Tamworth Athletic, there is no doubt that half-adozen versions of the tussle would be forthcoming, but after watching the game very closely throughout, I formed an opinion in all probability at variance with the views of the majority of the spectators. But to prepare my report, I should say that Barwell hasn't presented such a lively aspect for many a day. Everywhere one saw men and boys and even girls and women wearing the gay favours of the Albion team meeting the eye at every turn. The Albions won the toss, and Tamworth had to kick up-hill against a strong head wind. For the first half-hour the game was very fast, and Tamworth had hard lines indeed in not scoring. Over and over again the sphere either just went over the cross-bar or touched the outside of the goal posts, the right and left wings putting in some wonderfully good work. Albions scored after half-an-hour's play. sumption, after half-time, Tamworth made s stubborn resistance, but their play fell off dread-fully after the Albions secured the second goal after twenty minutes' play. The Albions scored another goal, but both teams played very loosely towards the end. The Albions, in my opinion, were the luckiest of winners. They are the heaviest team, but given equal conditions and a fair ground, I ishould stand Tamworth. Result :-

In beautiful spring-like weather, the final for the Hinckley Hospital Cup was played at Hinckley, before almost a record gate, between these teams. Amid great excitement, Mr McLaren, MP, kicked off, and both ends were visited in turn, but after forty minutes play Moore scored for Coalville from a free kick. The ball for the remainder of the first half was kept dangerously near the Barwell goal, but a splendid defence prevailed, and at the interval the score was:

On resumption some very good play was witnessed, and for a long time the Barwell team kept the ball in their opponent's territory, their passing being very neat, but they missed several very good chances which should have readily have been taken advantage of, Coalville, however, showed splendid combination, and ten minutes before time Gourley and Grewcock raced to the Barwell goal. Gourley got the best of the run, and scored a second time for Coalville. Result.
