Match Reports

1 KETTERNG v RUSHDEN

These Midland League teams met at Kettering, yesterday, in the first round of the Kettering Charity Cup before a large attendance. Miserable weather prevailed, and the ground was in a dirty condition. Rushden

had their strongest team, but Kettering played two reserves. Although Kettering's goal was jeopardized in the first few minutes, the homesters asserted their superiority, and McMain, Miller and Mablestone scored, Kettering, having much the best of the game. Result – Kettering, 3 goals; Rushden, nil. *Liverpool Mercury – 25 December 1895*

2 GRANTHAM ROVERS v. NOTTS. FOREST RESERVE

These teams met in the round of the Kettering Cup, on the Harlaxton-road Ground, Grantham, in the presence of a limited number of spectators. The time for the kick off was 2.45, but it was three o'clock before the referee had the following teams facing each other:

Grantham Rovers.—Shaw, goal; Morris and Hardy, hacks; Gash, Pulling, and White, halfbacks; Brittain and Allen, right wing; Wells, centre; John Senior and Jim Senior, left wing.

Notts Forest Reserve — Tebbutt, goal; Iremonger and Hunt, backs; Lowe, Abbott, and Beales, half-hacks; Hancock. Garratt Spencer, and Walker, forwards.

Half-time arrived with no score. Commencing, the sky became dull, rain falling sharply. Grantham at once aggressed, Iremonger relieving with a huge kick. Jim Spencer shot at terrific pace just outside goal, from a pass by his brother. The Rovers. urged on by the cheers of the spectators, played splendidly. Forest retaliated, but the forwards lacked combination. The visitors failed to convert from a foul close in, and from two corners shot wide. Although playing against a strong wind, Grantham were far ahead in all departments. Darkness began to set in 20 minutes to time. Neither centre forwards displayed really good form; indeed, Spencer was a complete frost. The backs and halfbacks defended well, Abbott being especially prominent. The ball dodged about in the Grantham goal once, but was cleared, and aided by a kick from Hardy, they again took up the attach. Result:

Notts Forest v Kettering – Played at kettering, before 4,000 spectators. Even play rule up to the interval, when nothing had been scored. Ten minuesafter the resart Miller beat Allsopp. Mc Pherson and ije retired hurt, but the latter returned. The home team had he best of the last few minutes but there was no further scoring. Frest playedtheir usual team with one exception. Result: Kettering, one; Notts Forest, nil. *Newcastle Daily Chronicle - 17 March 1896*

6 KETTERING CUP— Semi Final.

Aston Villa v. Burton Wanderers— At Kettering yesterday, before five thousand spectators. Villa, with the wind and sun in their favour, early attacked, Trueman scoring from a grand shot by Dorrell. Shortly

afterwards Capes equalised. Garfield put on Burton's second, and before the interval Devey added a third. Changing over the game was more even until close on time, when Devey added a fourth goal. Final : Burton, four; Aston, one.

7 KETTERING CHARITY CUP – FINAL KETTERING v BURTON WANDERERS

At Kettering before 4,000 spectators. In the first moiety Kettering had the best of matters, but could not find the net. In the last half the Wanderers attacked strongly, but Kettering were able to hold their own and the match ended in a pointless draw. The game was very rough at times, no less then eleven players were being cautioned. Result:

8 KETTERING CHARITY CUP REPLAYED FINAL

KETTERING v BURTON WANDERERS —These teams having failed to score in their first attempt to solve the question to the future temporary residence of the above trophy, the conflict was resumed at Kettering on Wednesday evening in the presence a great crowd. In the first half Kettering attacked strongly, and scored twice. There was no scoring in the second half, and the game ended Kettering two goals, Burton none. *Stamford Mercury – 1 May 1896*
