The United Counties League in the 1890s was a short-lived league between football clubs in the Midlands and Sheffield which ran in addition (and concurrently) to the Football League.

The competition only ran for two seasons, 1893/94 and 1894/95.

The 1893/94 was the only year the competition finished and was won by Derby County. The competition was organised as two separate leagues with the winner of each league playing each other in a final to determine the overall winner.

Group A contained four teams, Small Heath, Stoke, West Bromwich Albion and Wolverhampton Wanderers.

Group B contained five teams, Derby County, Nottingham Forest, Notts County, Sheffield United and Sheffield Wednesday.

The final was contested by West Bromwich Albion and Derby County. The final went to a replay which derby won 2-1 in front of 6,000 spectators.

Leicester Fosse competed in the 1894/95 competition, which comprised six East Midlands and Sheffield based clubs. Each team agreed to put into the field their full strength team and would take their own gate, but when they had a Saturday home match and their opponents a midweek match, the club with the Saturday match were required to give their opponents one fifth of the gate receipts.

The League fizzled out as sides failed to complete their fixtures. Nottingham Forest were top of the League at the end of the season. Leicester won just 2 of their 7 United Counties League games and finished 5<sup>th</sup> out of 6. Notts County were bottom of the league after failing to collect a single point of their 6 games.

### NOTTS v. SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY.

The second season of the United Counties League was opened at Nottingbam on Saturday, when Notts and Sheffield Wednesday fought their English Cup tis over again on the Frent Bridge Ground. fixture was looked upon as being a very interesting ose, and as both clubs guaranteed fall teams a big attendance was anticipated by the Norta executive. Unfortunately the weather was all in favour of skating, and there were barely 1000 people present. ground was covered with snow, which had been rolled. Both clubs had been compelled to make alterations in their teams. Shelt in and Allsopp being given a rest on the Notts side, their places being taken by reserve Arnott did not take part in the match, though it is said he is ancious to show the Notts executive he w much below his true form he played at Sheffi-ld; and Bruce, who played on the left wing at Olive Grove, went right back. Earp and Davis were absentees on the visitors' side, the first-named having an injured arm. Brandon partnered Langley, whilst Petrie, going over to right half, let in Jamieson. The contra formed action was filled by Jamieson. The centre-forward preition was filled by For, the latest acquisition to the team. In the first half Wednesday had the advantage of a dazzling sun, but the Notis front rank went off with a rush and pressed the visiting defenders very hard for the first few minutes. Then the Wednesday right wing got well off, and the ball being crossed. Spikesley gave his partner a nice chance, Brady hitting the cross-bar with a hard shot. After some loose play in the Wednesday half Logan tripped Spikesley, but Notts were quickly back again from the free kick, and for some time had the best of the game. Allan saved eleverly from Chadburn, and then a pretty passing run took the game to the other other end, where Spikesley shot through as the shistle went for off-side. From this point Wednesday played a very much amarter game than their opponents, notwithstanding that For was somewhat slow in the centre, and after balf an hour's

play. Spikesley crossed the ball from wing to wing, sad Ferrier meeting it sent well into the centre, where For had no difficulty in heading through, the home team unsuccessfully appealing for off-side against Ferrier. The visitors continued to have the best of it up to the inter-al, two minutes before which Brady again hit the cross-bar from exactly the same position. again hit the cross-bar from exactly the same position.

The Notts forwards came out of their shells in the second half, playing with rare dash after the first few mintnes, during which both Crawshaw and Scikesley had made good attempts to increase the visitors' score. Ferrier, in running r und Stothert, was kicked in the stomach, but he soon recovered, going outside to Brash. Notts were evidently anxi os to retrieve their position, and for the next quarter of an hour the game was as hard and ex-iting as if it had been a cup tie. They responded splendidly to the argent cries of the spectators, but the Wednesday defence was quite equal to the attack, Brandon playing with great energy and success. Once Bramly lit the side n t with a hard low shot, and immediately -fterwards Allan with difficulty saved a slot from Logan. A prolonged attack on the Sheffielders' goal followed the flag kick, but the visitors were safe in goal, and finally Spikesley ran the ball out of danger. He was, however, clearly in an off-side position, but refrained from touching the ball, and Bramley, taking it for granted that a free kick would be given, touched the ball back to the spot. The whistle not baving gone, however, Brash collered the ball, and ranning straight for the Notte goal bad no difficulty in getting the ball past Toone, who ran out to meet him. The referee disallowed the protest of the Notte men, and shortly afterwards the game came to an end with the score :-

### UNITED COUNTIES LEAGUE.

SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY V. NOTTS COUNTY.—At Olive Grove, Sheffield, before a poor crowd and on a heavy ground. Notts were a man short, whilst Wednesday rested Langley, Davis, and Ferrier. Goals were frequent, the score at the interval standing: Wednesday, 4 goals; County, 2. Afterwards Earp was absent with a badly sprained ankle, both sides having but ten men. Hendry was also hurt, and left the field. Result: Wednesday, 5 goals; Notts, 2.

Morning Leader - 5 March 1895

Leicester, before 1,500 spectators. Forest were strongly represented, but Fosse played a number of their second team. The Fosse pressed, and Striling scored from a fine centre by Whiteley five minutes from the start. Play was fairly even, but there was no further scoring in the first halt. Forest equalised ten minutes after the restart, and a moderate game ended in a draw of 1 goal each.
