No reports have been found of any of the Junior Cup draws. The combination of byes and multiple replayed games has made it difficult to work out the structure of the competition until the semi-final stage.

Only 2 of the 10 Round 1 ties were settled by the 28 November deadline. Four ties required replays; the remaining 4 ties had not been played.

According to one report it took 4 attempts to settle the Hinckley Town v Victor tie.

Loughborough Swifts [Cup Holders] were eliminated in Round 2.

The semi-final tie between Shepshed and Hinckley at Coalville was remarkable. Shepshed scored 5 goals without one going over the goal line – for the simple reason that those who had marked out the ground had omitted them! The match was ordered by the Association to be replayed.

Shepshed Town beat Hemington United 4-1 in the final played at Kegworth St Andrew's ground.

#4 SHEPSHED v LEICESTER FOSSE RESERVE

Few matches have attracted so much attention in local football circles during the last few years as the above, which was announced to take place at Shepshed. When the draw took place, the Fosse team had the choice of ground, but subsequently they were prevailed upon to fix the venue for the encounter at Shepshed; consequently, the past few days gave rise too much speculation as to the probable result. The natural interest in the game, and the keen rivalry between the clubs, together with the not unnatural desire to become holders of the coveted trophy, sufficed to attract a large attendance. The home team have not, during the present season suffered a reverse, the six matches played resulting in five wins and one draw, the number of goals to their credit being 29, against their opponents' seven only. Both clubs were well represented.

The Fosse won the toss and elected to play with the wind. Iliffe started the ball at 2.40. Shepshed soon pressed, and Bennett had an easy chance to score. Play continued fast and Lyle scored. Both goalkeepers had to save. At half time the Fosse led. In the second-half, with the wind in their favour, Shepshed had the best of the game throughout, Newbold only having to handle once. West soon equalised. Continuing to press, Kidger scored two minutes before time. Needham, Wortley, Iliffe, and Chamberlain played well.

#5 LOUGHBOROUGH ATHLETIC v KEGWORTH ST ANDREW'S

Played on the Athletic ground, Loughborough. Kegworth won the toss, and Loughborough kicked off. Play was very even during the first half. Each side put the ball through, but in each case it was ruled off-side. In the second half the Loughborough men had the wind in their favour, and with this advantage they kept the game in the visitors' end for some time. Ultimately Kegworth broke away, and made a vigorous attack on the home team's goal, which was however, repulsed. After this, play several times shifted from one end of the field to the other. At last, Hibbins, for Loughborough kicked the first goal in the match. Loughborough again attacked, and came near scoring. The Kegworth men now put on a spurt, took the ball in front of Loughborough's goal and in a few minutes Parker shot through. Kegworth again attacked and were having the best of it when time was called. Result:

#6 LOUGHBOROUGH SWIFTS v. BARROW

Played on Tyler's ground. The ground was in a very sodden state. Swifts (the holders of the cup) won the toss, and elected to kick with the wind, which was very strong. The home team soon pressed, and had a good chance, but the ball was shot too high. Simmons then had an opening, but the ball was kicked out, the state of the ground making it a difficult task to stand. Barrow plucked up, and a determined rush was ably stopped by Gorse. Still, they assumed the aggressive against the wind, and Ellis left the goal to meet Dawson on the left, who made a good run through. The backs gained possession, but did not clear, and but for Johnson's timely arrival the visitors would have scored. The Swifts now pressed, but failed to improve on two corners. Still, they kept near the goal, and Simmons put the ball through, but the referee disallowed the goal. This was quickly followed by another, which was also disallowed. The home team put the ball between the posts again, and an appeal for off-side was sustained. Give-and-take play followed for a few minutes, when half-time was called, the game standing—Swifts; nil ; Barrow, nil. The Swifts now had to face a strong wind, but were more than equal to the task, and the Barrow supporters, who very much fancied the wind,

found to their surprise that both wind and slippery ground made scoring a very difficult matter. After 20 minutes' play Jackson for the Swifts scored the first goal with a grand shot. Barrow tried hard to equalise, but Gorse and Woolley were too good for them. After continued pressing James sent the ball between the posts, adding the second goal for the Swifts. The "birds" took another flight, and Simmons receiving a nice pass from Armstrong smartly put the leather through, making the third goal for the Swifts. Nothing of any interest followed the game ending in a well-merited victory for the Swifts. Result:

FIRST ROUND

MELTON SWIFTS v LEICESTER HIGHFIELD SWIFT

The above-named teams met at Melton in the first round of the Leicestershire Junior Cup tie. The teams were: Melton Swifts – R Marshall, goal; C Barnes and J Richardson, backs; W Tyler, R Dunmore, and W Spiby, half-backs; W Slawson, centre; H Hand and J Wakerley, right wing; H Plant and R Mason, left wing; linesman, Mr R Warner. Highfield Swifts: A West, goal; H Wood, and J Harris, backs; H Tedds, A Freestone and J Turner, half backs; A Smith, centre; C Turner and T Brown, right wing; W Emmes and H Abbott, left wing; lineman, Mr F Tollington. Referee, Mr T S Ashmole. The north end of the ground was full of water pools, making kicking and goal-keeping very difficult. The visitors won the toss, and in five minutes after the start Emmes secured the ball and managed to score the first goal for his team. From the last of three corners which fell to their lot, a second goal – a rather questionable one – followed. The favourers of the home team manifested elongated countenances until Tyler put them in a good humour with a grand run along the right wing, where he nicely centred to Slawson, who put the leather through. At half-time the score was: Highfield Swifts two; Melton Swifts, one. On resuming play became very fast, with some roughness, but the referee made the offenders pay the penalty. It soon became clear that the Melton lads were once again showing their staying powers, while their opponents appeared to slow down somewhat, though in the first half they were the fleetest lot. #14 LEICESTERSHIRE JUNIOR CHALLENGE CUP HINCKLEY TOWN v VICTOR

It would have been a bold man who predicted a fourth draw to take place between these two teams, and yet so it was, and after two hard matches this season the first round for the Challenge Cup has still to be decided between them. The two previous contests were ordinary club fixtures, and, very strangely, the score of Saturday was exactly the total of the three previous games, namely, three goals each. The Victor dressed in the train to save time, and an early start was made on the Holy Well Ground, Hinckley, before a good number of onlookers, many of whom sported the injunction to "Play up Tin Hats!" Everything was nicely arranged, and Weston, losing the toss, had to play up-hill with a slight wind. Lovell started and Hinckley at once paid a visit to the enemy's quarters, forcing the game in the Victor lines for the first few minutes, but Bridger and Smith were "at home." The visitors quickly returned the compliment, Alexander being splendidly to the fore, this same player soon after calling forth praise for a grandly got goal, the ball just skimming under the bar. Hinckley resented this, and loud shouts, came from the sides to "wake up." Pratt not allowed to go to sleep, Arthur Shenstone from the left putting in some splendid centres, and Lovell should have scored from one, but Pratt beat him. Again a transformation, and the Victor goal was in danger, Orton, for the town, playing a dashing game and taking a lot of pulling-up. Hinckley, too, had hard lines, one splendid shot of theirs hitting the cross-bar and being got away. Half-time found the visitors leading by one goal. Hinckley did not mind this, and started the last half in fast style, their friends urging them on with approving shouts. The Victor were rushed off their feet despite the efforts of Cooper and Alexander. Then come the best bit of play during the match, Elsworth receiving and making a magnificent run. The visitors' back men could not stop him, and it ended in a well-deserved goal off the foot of Spencer. The spectators were loud in their cheers for the fine play. Still working at high pressure, they quickly got number two and three, Manton and Bassett being responsible, the last one being a very swift thing. Few were expecting the sudden change which took place, from this point to the whistle sounding the "blue and reds" had heaps the best of the game. Weston set his men a rare example. Will Shenstone put in some

smart runs, and soon his side "nicked" another goal. Weston "banging" the ball into Pratt, who saved, but Skeffington's head was in the way, and he safely got the leather through. This was followed by a third from the right, Shaw, who had been playing extremely well, beating Pratt with a well-judged cross-shot. Only seven minutes were now left, and these were chiefly spent in the "City" lines, and time was called with the score as stated. Elsworth and Orton were a rare couple for Hinckley. Garrett made his presence felt, and Spencer set the forwards a good example. #16 HINCKLEY TOWN v LEICESTER VICTOR After five hard matches between these teams, a definite decision has at length been arrived at, Hinckley proving themselves victors, and emerging successfully through the first round of the Junior Cup. This was accomplished by the narrowest of margins, namely, one goal to nil, and is a still further proof of the evenness of both clubs. The present match was played at Hinckley, the visitors arriving in time for a start at three o'clock.
