The final was staged at Barrow. Sileby beat Hemington United 2-1 in an enjoyable game in front of 1500 spectators. Directly after the finish Mr Lovell (chairman of the Leicestershire Football Association) presented the cup to the winners and medals to both teams. The Sileby team on the return home were met at the entrance to the town by two equestrians and the Wycliffe Brass Band playing, "Seeing the Conquering Hero comes." Bearing the trophy aloft they marched in procession to the Coach and Horses Inn, the football club's headquarters, where they were heartily complimented on their achievement. The medals were presented to the players the following week.

JUNIOR CUP MATCHES

In consequence of cup-ties, the local and district leagues were practically at a standstill on Saturday, but comment on the "pot hunting" business would be superfluous until the weeding process has taken place. The Leicestershire Junior Cup was in very strong evidence, the game being contested in the customary cup-tie fashion, with the result that some of the scores were exactly the reverse of anticipations, whilst in other instances the combatants were so evenly balanced that the respective clubs will have to renew their acquaintance of one another and fight their battles o'er again next Saturday.

Sileby Rangers and Quorn Havelock met at Sileby, before a moderate gate. The Rangers won the toss and therefore had the wind and sun behind them in the first half. But the homesters, with the aid of the wind, soon had the best of matters, and kept the Havelocks well in their own half, but could not score until twenty minutes had elapsed. Then E Wood headed through. Excellent passing between Earl, West and Lawrence was then exhibited, and West sent in a terrific shot, with which Stubbs had not the least chance. This occurred after 23 minutes play. The Rangers played up well, and, attacking again, Earl put on the third goal with a grand shot. Soon after, Mr. A Marson, the referee, sounded half-time, the score being three to nil in the Rangers' favour. A Quorn correspondent says that the third goal had a strong suspicion of offside about it.


On changing, the visitors played up better, but at no time during the game did they show up to anything like the advantage they have previously done, the forwards, amongst whom Thornton was placed hors de combat through colliding with the goalkeeper in the first ten minutes, being very disappointing. 

LEICESTERSHIRE JUNIOR CUP

The second round took place on Saturday, the results being as below:

The match between Melton and Enderby was a most exciting and well-contested one. Enderby scored in the first half, and led in the first half, and led at the interval, but ten minutes after resuming Melton drew level, and had much the best of the game afterwards, but owing to kicking out tactics they were unable to score again, and he result was a draw of one goal.

The Dons have once again passed into the third round of the Junior Cup competition. Drawing a bye in the first round they were pitted against Coalville Albion in the second. The Albion were the only organisation to lower the colours of the North Leicestershire champions last year in the League competition. Saturday's engagement, however, was a cup tie, and the Dons have made themselves famous in this direction, and their play on occasion was, if anything, above their average form. The Albion won the toss and set the Dons to play up hill against a strong wind.

Long before half-time it was evident that the Dons would win, their play being characterised by more method than was that of the Albion. The score at the interval was two each.

In the second half the Dons carried all before them, and the Coalville citadel was in a state of perpetual siege. Seven times altogether did the Coalville goal surrender, though for some reason several of these points were disallowed. Mr. Lambert states that he has never before seen so many shots repelled in one match, the Coalville keeper being constantly clearing. Often under great difficulties.

The Albion seldom passed the centre line, the Dons by their scientific passing and judicious placing completely penning their opponents. The result was a win for the PSA by four to two.


