#2 LOUGHBROUGH FOREST ROVERS v MOUNTSORREL CASTLE RESERVES

Played at Mountsorrel under the supervision of Mr. Beale, Kegworth. The Rovers had the advantage of the toss, but the Castle pressed strongly during the first ten minutes. The Rovers' defence, however, stood the test well, and by good combination in the forward rank they had a spell of attacking. Dodge, however, saved well successive shots from Stevens, Smith, and Bennett, Again, the Castle pressed, and the Rovers' goal had a very narrow escape when Wadd hit the top of one of the uprights with a good shot. The Rovers played a steady game, and eventually gained the upper hand, the right wing bringing the ball into the centre for W. Smith to open the score. Castle made strenuous efforts to equalise without effect, and Bennett, through being over anxious, missed a good chance of increasing the Rovers' lead. Smith netted the ball from Hood's centre, but was given offside, though the ball off the line. The Rovers continued to have much the better of matters, but the custodian saved repeatedly. At the interval only one goal had been registered, crossing over, the Rovers forwards played finely, and pressing strongly Stevens put on the second goal, Smith following with a third. The last twenty minutes was nothing but a struggle between the home defence and the Rovers' forwards. Bennett put on two more goals, and Simmons and Hood each scored one, the result being a seven to nil victory for the Rovers. Dodge played well in goal for the Castle, some of his clearances being very neat. The Rovers' success was chiefly due to good combination of the forwards, well supported by the rear divisions, and they should give a good account of themselves in the competition. The Rovers' team was: Cooks; Streets, and H. L. Smith; Goodwin, Rodgers, and Powell; Hood, Simmons, Stevens, W. Smith, and Bennett.

#3 LOUGHBOROUGH CORINTHIANS v MOUNTSORREL ST PETER'S RESERVES

Loughborough Corinthians took a very weak eleven to Mountsorrel, the team being practically a reserve one. The Corinthians lost the toss, and faced the sun. St Peter's were quickly at the visitors' end, but Palmer cleared well, and the Corinthians gradually asserted themselves, their forwards work showing accuracy and cohesion. The Saint's lack failing to cope with a sharp cross-shot from the Corinthians' right, the ball glanced off his leg into the net. F Gadsby next headed into the net from a clearance by the goal-keeper. Although the

long grass hampered short passing, the visitors played an effective game, and would probably have scored oftener but for the difficulty of shooting out of the grass. During the second half the Peter's goal had to submit to a prolonged assault, although only one goal was scored. The Saints' only broke over the half-way line occasionally, and then the visiting defence easily stemmed the rushes. Their goalkeeper played well. For the Corinthians C. Gadsby and Palmer was most prominent in the defence, while Hodgin and G Gadsby did most of the aggressive work, through the forwards all played well and keenly. Barker, in goal, was never tested. #14-15 LOUGHBOROUGH CORINTHIANS v CASTLE DONINTON

The two Loughborough clubs, granted an extension of time owing to the Loughborough Cup matches, should have played off their ties last Saturday, but Loughborough Forest Rovers were given a walk-over by the Rising Star Reserves, who found themselves unable to raise a Shied team.

Loughborough Corinthians went to Castle Donington to play off their ties on the Station-road ground. There was a good company present. The Corinthians were the better set of fellows in the matter of weight. A sharp rain fell as the Dons kicked off. The home forwards started in sensational fashion, for the game was scarcely a minute old when, after pretty passing on the right, Poxon scored a lovely goal. The Corinthians then got away, Moss being conspicuous for good play, and, but for the state of the ground, goals must have resulted. The Don's pressed again, and Barket running out to save, the ball was kicked towards the goal, and Moss took upon himself the task of goalkeeper for a brief moment. A penalty was awarded, and, to the intense chagrin of the Dons supporters, Dakin shot outside. Dr Symington and Palmer played a fine game at back. Just before the interval the Dons made a rush, and Simpson scored again with a good shot, Barker, having no chance, half-time coming with Donington leading by two goals to none. On resuming, play was fast and even, both sides being continually applauded for smart play. The Loughborough forwards combined nicely, F. Gadsby putting in a lot of useful work. The ball was dropped into goal, and a tussle ensuing, A. Moss dispatched it into the net for the Corinthians' first goal. This livened up the Dons and very exciting play followed. The Loughborough left combined well, and C. Gadsby put in a shot which Cliff knocked out with his arm. The inevitable penalty following, A. Moss took the kick, and made no mistake, Loughborough being played on equal terms. Both sides tried hard for the winning goal, and the Dons breaking away, C. Gadsby and Morley, who were playing very strongly, pulled them up nicely, and nothing but mud and hard luck prevented them for gaining the leading goal, the end coming with the game a draw of two goals. A Castle Donington correspondent says the Corinthians played a gentlemanly game throughout. And that their conduct on and off the field reflected the greatest credit upon them. There was not a very large crowd to witness this encounter on Saturday last on the Anstey ground. The home team were poorly represented, while the visitors had a strong eleven, and played a sterling game. Mr. Carter started the ball just after the appointed time, and it was soon evident the home team were outclassed. After some desultory football in midfield, the visitors got by the home backs, and put one into the net. They were soon at it again, and after a struggle they beat Willett, and easily put goal number two past the home custodian. When the ball was again set rolling, the home front relieved the pressure somewhat, but when a good opening presented itself, the forwards muffed it. The visiting forwards were not long before they were at it again, and at half-time they led by five goals to none. Resuming play was of an uninteresting character, the visiting team having matters much their own way. Several times the home team crossed the half-way line, but their visits were of short duration. Before the whistle called time, eight goals stood to the credit of the Old Boys; Anstey Twon second, none.

The home team were thoroughly out-classed, and Leicester Old Boys are a team to be reckoned with in the Shield competition. The play was exceedingly good, especially that of the forwards. The Ansteyites have one or two fair players, but of the rest the least said the better. A big day is expected next Saturday, when the Town first team, who showed such good form against Earl Shilton, are entertaining Loughborough Reserves. He was placed in goal, the previous occupant changing places with him. The exchange proved unsatisfactory, and the Corinthians, although playing the far batter game, and having many more shots at goal than the

Donington players, had the hard luck to sustain an easy defeat. They scored three good goals, but Donington registered six, owing to the cause stated. The visitors scarcely put in more than a dozen shots throughout the match.

#40—41 SEMI-FINAL
THE FIRST ROVERS MAKE A DRAW

These semi-finals were played on Saturday. At Oakham the Rovers beat Leicester St Matthew's Vicarage by the narrowest possible margin, viz, one gal to none, and the probabilities are that had the tie been played on neutral ground the Vicarage would have won.

The other tie was between Loughborough Forest Rovers and South Wigston Albion, and was played on the Athletic Grounds, Loughborough. The attendance was very poor, the receipts not covering expenses. There were not nearly so many present as when the Rovers played the previous round off on their own enclosure on Cotes-road. The Albion were a much older and weightier lot than the Rovers. Wigston started with the wind, but were quickly placed on the defensive. Bennett finished a nice run with a good centre, from which W. Smith scored for the Rovers after only four minutes play. The visitors then put in some good work, and were not long before they equalised. Each side strove hard, and, for the Rovers, Baker shot straight into the goalkeeper's hands. Wigston, however, played strongly, and a fine shot from one of the half-backs gave them the lead. The Rovers played up, but Baker twice shot outside. At the interval Wigston led by two goals to one. For a while after the resumption the Albion had the better of the matters, but were met by a sound defence, and eventually the Rovers applied pressure. The visitors kicked out, and conceded several corners to save. Stevens twice shot wide and several centres from Bennett were only prevented, taking effect by the superior weight of the opposing defence. Keeping up the pressure, Bennett was badly fouled inside the twelve yards line, and the referee gave the usual penalty, which was taken by H. Smith, who made no mistake, and brought the score level again. The Rovers went for all they were worth, and had hard lines in not getting the lead. Baker was given few liberties, and Bennett was badly fouled just outside the penalty lin. The end came with the score two goals each. The Rovers and spectators appealed for extra time, but the referee and linesman ruled otherwise. #42 RE-PLAYED SEMI FINAL SUCCESS OF THE FOREST ROVERS

After the drawn game on the Athletic Grounds, the Loughborough Forest Rovers and South Wigston Albion were ordered to meet at Syston where the match came off last Saturday. Both sides were slightly altered from the previous week. Wigston won the toss, and had the advantage of the slope first half. They went off with a rare dash, and for several minutes play was dangerously near the Rover's goal, but the defence stood the test, and the siege was raised. Then Stevens, after beating both backs, seemed certain to score, but his shot struck the bar, Baker, from the rebound, shooting outside Wigston again forced matters, but play eventually settled down, and each goal was visited. Hood shot into the Albion goalkeeper's hands. At the interval the score sheet was blank. The Rovers re-started in business-like fashion, hemming the Albion in. The Wigston defenders, however, played a rare game, and staved off disaster. Norman got away several times, but his centres were cleared, and in the Rovers returning the attack, they were too closely watched to do anything in the scoring line. Hood put in the best centre of the afternoon, without effect. A couple of corners to the Albion were fruitless. Powell bringing off some smart clearances. W. Smith grazed the bar, and Stevens shot, just over. Time was called with the game a draw, there being no score. An extra half hour was played, and Wigston, again winning the toss, kicked downhill in the first quarter. However, the Rovers pressed, Stevens shooting over from a good position. Play continued fast, but eventually told on both sides, though the Rovers appeared to stand the strain better. The first quarter went by with no score, and in the last stage the Rovers made a determined attack on the Wigston goal. The goalkeeper cleared from Baker, but the ball was returned, and the custodian, scooping it out again, placed it nicely to Bennett, who shot it through a heap of players into the net, this success coming after 110 minutes play. Wigston made a desperate effort, and struck the bar, another shot being saved by Powell. The Rovers then held the sway, and ran out winners by a goal to none, pressing into the final stage after a most interesting two hours' struggle. The Rovers played splendidly from start to finish, especially the defence. Powell gave a fine exhibition in goal.

The unfavourable weather was all against a good gate for this match, which was played on the all-England Ground, Melton although taking all things into consideration the attendance was by no means bad. Oakham began to press, but Loughborough got down and after a considerable number of attempts to score, forced a corner without result. From a foul by a Loughborough back, a clever run was made by the opposing team, and some good work was seen near the goal. Loughborough eventually gained relief, and a lot of uninteresting play followed. A corner was forced by Oakham, which took full advantage of it by rushing the ball through. Half-time:

OAKHAM, one goal LOUGHBOROUGH, none

In the first part of the second half some fine passing was displayed by both sides, but towards the finish the game became very slow. Oakham having matters practically their own way. Loughborough were unable to score, while their opponents added three goals to their credit. Result:
