The defeat of Castle Donington at Woodhouse was the surprise of the afternoon. The holders of the trophy, although not having done anything remarkable in the last week or two, were confident of being able to defeat the Loughborough Leaguers.

Loughborough Emmanuel were somewhat unlucky in being beaten at Shepshed by the Town Club, the latter obtaining their winning goal on the point of time. The Emmanuel were unable to play F York, owing to having played in the Senior Cup Competition last year.

Loughborough Corinthians are not cup fighters. They let another chance slip last Saturday by the same score as Shepshed knocked them out of the Loughborough Charity Cup. In the first al the Corinthians had the wind, but could not score, there being no goals at the interval. On crossing over, Kidger had the ill-luck to put through his own goal, and Hathern netting one themselves won accordingly.

Barrow rising Star have seriously offended their younger players. It was decided that as the reserve team could not take part in the Sheild Competition, owing to ineligibility, they should compete for the Junior Cup. When the cub was drawn with their keenest rivals, Quorn Havelock, the temptation to play their full strength proved too strong, and the youngsters were given the "cold shoulder". This was very disappointing for the Reserves, but it was the best policy, for the latter would have stood no chance, and the "gate" would have suffered considerably. An exciting and even match was witnessed, and the Stars gained the day by the skin of their teeth, so to speak.

The victory of Kegworth at Barrow over the Excelsior was somewhat of a surprise, as the home club were confidently anticipating retrieving their fortunes. Kegworth had the benefit of both wind and slope in the first portion, and let at the interval by two – lucky – goals, both scored by Poxon, to none. The Excelsior had nearly all the play in the second half, but could not beat the defence, Poxon (in goal) playing a grand game, the end coming with the visitors winners by two goals to none. It is stated that a protest has been lodged. Whitwick White Cross found Barlestone United a stiff nut to crack, the runners-up only just getting home. Syston Swifts were greatly surprised by the Soldiers who will certainly run well in the competition, if Saturday's performance is nay criterion.

A good game was witnessed at Melton between the Town and Kibworth. The latter had the benefit of the wind in the first half, but the score was not opened until half an hour had elapsed. Melton equalized but Kibworth quickly put on two more, and led at half-time by three goals to one. The Town scored again

immediately on resuming and although they had nearly all of the game, they did not equalise till five minutes from time, in a scrimmage.





#43 MARKET HARBOROUGH AND DISTRICT FOOTBALL JUNIOR CUP TIE.

After an interval of about a couple of months, Market Harborough had a first team match at home last Saturday. Harborough were drawn to meet Barrow Rising Star at Barrow, in the fourth round of the Junior Cup Competition, but the Barrow ground being unfit for play, Barrow waived their right to the choice of ground and came to Harborough. There was a pretty good gate, and the greater portion of the spectators were fully prepared to see Harborough go down. In a capital game, however, Harborough won by three goals to one, and thus enter the semi-final. In the that half play was very and the teams appeared to be well matched. Barrow let one or two chances slip, and Harborough at the other end gave the Barrow defence a Warm time. After about half-an-hour's play, Ireson put in a beautiful centre, and Buswell headed the ball through, this being Harborough's first goal, and a good one too. No more scoring took place before the interval, but immediately on re-starting Harborough played brilliantly, and in a few minutes Turner added a second goal. Then for a time the visitors had all the best of the argument. They got the ball into the net, but off-side spoiled the effort Not to be denied, however, they soon scored a legitimate point, and at this time Harborough looked well out of it. Barrow had desperately hard lines once or twice, two shots striking the upright, and then the tide turned once more and Harborough were very busy at the other end. Turner slipped past two or three men and stored single-handed— a splendid effort, and this dashed Barrow's hopes to the ground. Harborough ran out winners as stated, and they well deserved the honour, for with the exception of a quarter-of-an-hour in the second half they held the upper hand throughout. #44-45 HARBOROUGH AND DISTRICT FOOTBALL A great amount of interest centred in the meeting of Market Harborough and the 17th Regimental District, at Harborough, on Saturday, in the Leicestershire Junior Cup semifinal. There was a good gate. The soldiers had always gone down previously at Harborough, but this time they effected a surprise, and, though they could not score, they would not let the Harborough men get through, and the game ended in a pointless draw. It was most evenly contested. Each side had openings, and lost them, the play not being very scientific. Each side shone most in defence. In the Harborough goal, Plowman exhibited splendid judgment on several occasions. Fanner, at back, was a tower of strength, and has rarely played better. West was the best of the halves. The forwards were below their usual standard—in fact, on neither side could the forwards be said to have done anything great. Amongst the soldiers' halfbacks, "Bonnie "Wilford, the ex-Harborough player, was in good form. He stuck to Bagwell and Bromley like grim death, with the result that the usually dangerous left wing pair could never settle down to their proper game. McKillop, at back, was about the best man on the side, and put in Pity amount of good work. The goalkeeper, too, proved a very useful man.

In the other Junior Cup semi-final, Burbage made no mistake with Barlestone, beating them by five goals to one.

MARKET HARBOROUGH v. BURBAGE UNITED

This match took place at Market Harborough, on Easter Monday, before a record gate of over 1,200 people. Both teams were fully represented, and great excitement prevailed. A strong wind blew straight down the ground, and of this Harborough, on winning the toss, took advantage. Making full use of the wind, they scored within a few minutes. Following the centre kick, Harborough had plenty of opportunities, but failed to take advantage, and although playing against a perfect hurricane, Burbage were often dangerous. Half time: — Market Harborough, one goal; Burbage, nothing. Directly after the restart, from a foul, Burbage equalised, and although the Harborough defence was excellent and their custodian in first-class form, they were unable to prevent Burbage from scoring by Lucas shortly afterwards. The wind prevented anything like accuracy in shooting, and with the Burbage team pulling away Harborough pressed for a time without result. About five minutes from time, however, they were fortunate, through miskicking, on the part of a Burbage back, in equalising, West putting through. Iime was called shortly afterwards, with the game a

A late start was made. Market Harborough won the toss and chose to kick up a considerable slope, with the advantage of a slight wind. Play for a time was of a very even character, though it soon became apparent that the home team were rexxx an enormous advantage of their acquaintance with a ground that for undulations and graceful slopes is probably second to no football field in the county. The ball quickly travelled into the visitors' quarters, and Lucas put in a shot that failed. Tilley transferred to the other end of the field, and Howitt, missing his kick, nearly let in the Harborough forwards, who forced a corner; but with some good hard work the United backs saved the situation. Clarke shortly afterwards failed to take advantage of a good chance in front of the Burbage goal. Lucas sprinted inn his usually nimble style down the wing and centred beautifully. Worthington met but was charged off the ball when on the point of shooting. Harborough got in a rush and forced a corner, Buswell landing the leather well into the goal mouth, but Taylor punched out. West obtained by tricking Marshall, and took the leather well into the home 25, but Warren returned. The spectators were treated to an effective display by the home attacking line, which resulted in a corner, while Framer punted out of danger. After 35 minutes' play the United forwards made a rush with a pace accelerated by the slope, and breaking through the Harborough defence, Marshall scored first honours. From the kick off Harborough quickened the pace, and Bromley got in a shot that tried the home custodian, who saved at the expense of a corner. The ball was landed well into the mouth of the goal, but Taylor admirably threw out. The home forwards continued to show superior combination to their opponents, and some particularly clever head work was conspicuous in the way the halves fed them. "Sixer" got in a good sprint on the wing and finished with a well placing the leather to his centre., who shot without effect. The Harborough backs however, failed to get the ball well away, and time after time their goal was assailed. At length the application of the Burbage forwards was rewarded a few minutes before half-time, when the score was:

BURBAGE, two goals;

MARKET HARBOROUGH, none.

Resuming, Harborough seemed to reap no advantage from the change, their forwards being quite unable to control the ball on the slope, and the game for a long time was of an uninteresting and tame description. A corner was given to Burbage and Lucas got in a lovely centre. Plowman tipped over the shot that followed, two other corners followed in quick succession, nothing resulting. West then made a change in the disposition of his team and himself went forward, but this improved matters very little. Marshall dribbled up the centre, and passed out to Worthington, who put through the net with an oblique shot which Plowman was unable to negotiate. The referee disallowed the goal on the off-side rule. A foul was given against Harborough within their own 25, and 16 minutes after resuming play Burbage brought their score up to 3-0 by Smith heading through. This appeared to demoralise Harborough, and a few minutes later Marshall again rushed through, but the points were disallowed for charging the goalkeeper. Harborough made an attempt to save a worse

defeat and forced a corner. Wets took the kick but landed the leather much too far. Harborough again made a more concerted attack, and when looking like scoring Turner failed in his shot. Subsequently the Harborough goal and was bombarded, but Plowman disguised himself with clever saves. a few minutes before the call of time Worthington centred, and Toone meeting put through a lightning shot and the game ended:

BURBAGE UNITED, four goals;
MARKET HARBOROUGH, none.
Mr. Marston presented the cup on behalf of the association.
