At the January management Committee of the Leicester Twon league which met at the Victoria Coffee House in Leicester:

- The League match, Criterion v Humberstone-road PM on January 6 which ended as a 4-2 away win was ordered to stand. This game was stopped for 10 mins before time, owing to darkness. The visiting team and the referee were waiting on the field 45 minutes for the home team (Criterion) to turn up. The Criterion team were severely censured for their unsportsmanlike conduct.
- Cumberland FC wrote asking permission to resign membership of the League. The Committee decided to accept the resignation but as the Cumberland were considerably in arrears with the subscriptions the matter was referred to the Leicestershire Football Association.
- An application from St Saviour's Old Boys FC to join the Lague was granted after they agreed to fulfil the remaining fixtures of Criterion FC.





LEICESTER TOWN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP MATCHES

Two matches in connection with the above League were played on Saturday on the martin-street ground. The first contest was between the Imperial (Champions of the South) and a picked team representing the South district). The second match was contested by Oxford Victoria (Champions of the Noth) and a representative eleven from the North district), a goodly crowd of spectators assembled, and much interest was evinced in the matches.

IMPERIAL v REST OF SOUTH

Following the kick-off the Rest at once began to attack, and after some spirited forward work Tomlinson scored a good goal. The Rest were not long before augmenting their score, Dilly putting through from close range. Proceeding, the Imperial took up the running, and applied severe pressure, but the defence of the scratch team withstood all attacks. Not to be denied, the champions continued on the aggressive, and ultimately Johnson registered their first goal. From a throw-in the ball went to Ward, who made a good effort to get through, but on nearing his opponent's goal Green came to the rescue, and grassed him. Afterwards the game was of an even character, and when half-time arrive the score was as follows:

REST OF THE SOUTH DISTRICT, two goals; IMPERIAL, one.

Smith, for the Rest, started the second half, but the Champions were the first to become dangerous, and their opponents were compelled to concede a comer. This, however, proved abortive, Jinks affecting a creditable save. Still pressing, the Champions provided the Rest with plenty of defensive work, and two corners were granted in quick succession, but he ball went behind in each case. By way of a change, the Rest had a run down, the right wing combining very prettily, and managing to get to the vicinity of the Champion's' citadel, but the backs promptly cleared, and play as transferred to the other end of the field. Immediately following, the Imperial, through the agency of Ward, put on a second gal, this equalising the scores. The "Imps" continued to press, but were unable to add to their score,, and when time was announced the game was in the following condition:

OXFORD VICTORIA v REST OF NORTH

Immediately after the conclusion of the previous match, the above teams entered upon their contest. Unfortunately, the North team was not as strong as could have been desired, two or three of the chosen men failing to put in an appearance and substitutes had to be requisitioned. After the ball had been put in motion, the Vics lost no time in making tracks for their opponents' goal, and Norman had little difficulty in scoring a goal in the first few minutes. The representative team then came into possession, but were unable to make much headway, the kicking of the back division being very strong. Following a spell of quiet play, the champions forced a corner, but it was unproductive. The Vics, who are a very smart combination, were unable to increase their lead, and hen half-time arrived the score rad as follows:

OXFORD VICTORIA, one goal;

REST OF NORTH DISTRICT, none.

Daley, following the interval, put the ball in motion, and although the North team made the initial run, the Champions were not long before placing their opponents on the defensive, and after the ball had hovered about the goal for a short period Ward put it through and scored the Champions' second goal. The scratch forwards then showed up in a rather better light, and on several occasions they were able to get within shooting range of the Champions' goal, but although they made several good attempts nothing tangible accrued. On the other hand, Norman was instrumental in registering a third point for the Champions. Throughout the game cessations of play were frequent owing to the ball being kicked into the adjoining field. In the expiring stages of the game the Rest showed better form than at any previous period of the game, and but for poor shooting would probably have scored. As no further scoring took place, the "Vics" left the field winners of a rather one0sded game, the following being the result:

LEICESTER TOWN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP

OXFORD VICTORIA (NORTH) v IMPERIAL (SOUTH)

These teams having gained the championship in their respective divisions, met on the Filbert-street Ground, in front of the Fosse-Brighton game, to decide the championship of the league. The weather was of the most ideal character, and both clubs were at full strength, and lined up under Mr Jinks, in the following order:

Oxford: Harding, goal; Measures and Bxxx, backs; Riley, Smith and Foulks, half-backs; Norman. Lee, Daly, Herbert and Wesson, forwards.

Imperial: Hollowood, goal; Beasley and Mosly, backs; Cufflin, West and Griffin, half-backs; Burgess, Johnson, Rosevere, Barrows ad West, forwards.

Oxford won the toss, and set the Imperial to face the bright sun, play opened in brisk fashion, the ball travelling up and down the field in quick succession. Then Oxford, after a throw-in forced a corner but the kick went behind. From the goal kick the Imperial bore down, but with offside nullified a splendid opening. Following this the Imperial still attacked, and Foulkes kicking across his own goal. Rosevere shot at the right moment, thus drawing first blood for the "Imps". Going on, Oxford had slightly the better of the argument, Smith sending wide when close up. Then, after a lot of touch-line lay, Foulkes, with a long drooping shot from the extreme left, beat the Imperial custodian, thus equalising amid enthusiasm. From the re-start Imperial had a trifle the best of the play, but a free for a foul against them resulted in the downfall of their goal, Norman bashing the letter into the net from a long range. Resuming, an attempt at combination was made by both teams, but their efforts lacked finish, Oxford ultimately sending behind. A good run by Burgess on the South left looked dangerous, and Barrows, shooting when offside, a good opening was apparently thrown away. Oxford now bore down, Beasley relieving with a strong kick. Lee, for Oxford, hereabouts was seen to advantage just missing a goal by inches only. Following this, Ward was to the fore with a neat run, but sent behind from an obligue shot. Hereabouts a hot attack was set up on the North goal, but the anxiety was relieved with Smith sending the ball high over the net. Nothing, save a piece of good play by Foulkes on Oxford's right was seen for some time, the ball in turn ging behind at either end, whilst free kicks were pretty numerous to either side, the shot from Daley being deserving of the better results. Then a kick from Wesson, after an individual dribble along from the extreme right, met with no better success. Imperial kept up a string attack right up to the interval, but failed to draw level, the score standing at:

OXFORD, two goals;

IMPERIAL, one.

Crossing over, the opening exchanges were a trifle slack, the pace of the first half having apparently told its ale upon both teams. Still Oxford, through good play by Wesson kept imperial strictly on the defensive, Hollowood having a warm time, but he was equal to the occasion, the ball eventually going behind from a shot by Herbert. Next Oxford had to concede a corner, the centre being too weak to be of much use. A neat piece of combination between the whole of the Imperial backs looked ominous for the Oxford goal, but Ward failed to steady himself, and thus put in a wild shot that resulted in a goal kick only. Imperial again got on the move. Measures pulling himself up in splendid fashion. Then the best item of interest was the offensive back play of Morley for Imperial, by which method he repulsed several hot attacks of the Oxford men. For the next ten minutes play was for the most part of a weak character. Imperial eventually gaining the upper hand, and forced Harding to handle, Johnson kicking over. From the restart Imperial set up a hot attack, and from a scrummage right in the Oxford goal mouth, the ball was rushed through, thus brining the score two all. Immediately from the restart the Imperial were close to Oxford's citadel again, and Barrows going through alone put his side ahead with a fast low shot that gave Harding no chance. It was plainly to be seen that Oxford were now a beaten team, Imperial missing a goal from the extreme right by the merest margin. After Oxford had paid a brief visit to the other end, Ward was seen in good form, and breaking through all opposition, landed still another goal to the Imperial's already strong lead. Then from a free close up, the ball was again sent by Harding. The fifth gal against Oxford caused them to lose heart considerably, and as a result were kept strictly on the defence. Time was now called, with the score standing:

Additional Information

LEICESTER TOWN FOOTBALL LEAGUE.

The two divisions of the Leicester Town Football League brought the season finally to a clese on Wednesday with a smoker, at the Three Cranes Hotel, when the medals were presented to the succes-ful clubs. Mr. A. E. Marson presided over a large attendance, including representatives of all the clubs engaged, and in addition there were present the Rev J. W. A. Mackenzie, of Whitwick, Mr. J. E. Carpenter (secretary Leicestershire Football Association), and Mr. F. L. Jinks (secretary of the League). The winners of the Southern Division were the Imperial, who had a splendid record. were the Imperial, who had a splendid record. Out of 14 matches played, they won 13, the other one being drawn, and scored 115 goals against six, thus gaming 27 points out of a possible 28. The eleven players who received medals were. S. West, S. Ward, J. Johnson, G. Hollowood, G. Beasley, J. Griffen, F. Cufflin, W. Bar-rows, C. Rosvear, and T. Burgess. There were a num-ber of secessions in the Northern Division, and the final result was that Oxford Victoria were at the top, with 10 points, they having lost one match out of the six played, and scored 37 goals against two. Their players Out of played, and scored 37 goals against two. Their players were: J. Harding, T. Bacon, J. Measures, E. Riley, R. Snutch, E. Fawkes, H. Weston, A. Daley, A. Norman, Foster, and H. Herbert. The presentations were made by the Rev. J. W. A. Mackenze, who, in the course of his remarks, advised the clubs to stick together, and encouraged those at the bottem to keep on trying, until they improved their positions. They ought to do that, if only for the sake of the management, who had devoted so much time and trouble to the League. He attributed the success of his own club to the fact that they had hung well together, and quoted them as an example of what might be done. He also mentioned that the whole of the members were Whitwick men .-Mr. J. E. Carpenter paid a tribute to the splendid work done by the management of the League, and said that it took a great deal of work off the shoulders of the asso-Since the formation of the League they had ciation. had no trouble with the clubs in the matter of the fulfilment of fixtures. so that a good work had been done in that direction alone.-The rest of the evening was spent in conviviality.
