Ernest Bennett, the inside left, made a pretty run down the field, and drew first blood for the home team within a couple of minutes, and he netted the ball a second time after ten minutes. Groby had the Blaby men at their mercy, and secured a corner, which was converted by G Brooks. G Bennett mad a pretty run, and obtained the fourth point. Then Blaby had a look in, and the outside right scored, but just before the whistle blew for half-time the home centre-forward put in a fine shot, which the visitor's custodian who unable to stop. Half-time more: Groby, five goals, Blaby, one.

Resuming Blaby made a fine rush down the field and looked like scoring, but were kept well at bay by the home backs. Rudkin playing a very correct game. Groby still had the best of the game, but only got through once, by F Wood. Groby are to be complimented on their brilliant victory. These teams lined up on the St Matthew's ground, under the supervision of Mr Linthwater. The home side won the toss, and Dixon put the ball in motion. The home team made a strong run down the field, and Marple scored with a lightning volley within the minute. The home team then pressed severely, and Grudgings had a most anxious time. Dilly put in a beautiful shot, but Grudgings fisted away splendidly, and Moore cleared in grand form. Grudgings for the next ten minutes had some very tough work in store, but proved equal to all demands. Try as Ratby would, they could not open their account. A penalty was allowed the Saints, Taylr being the offender, but the shot was erratic. Ratby could not shake off the visiting forwards, who played with tact and determination, and League put in a fine shot, which Grudgings returned. Close on half-time Ratby raced away, but when in a fine position for shooting the whistle blew for right turn, the score reading: St Matthew's, one goal, Ratby, none. Resuming the Vicarage were soon the aggressive and gained a corner. Dilly directly afterwards finding the net in brilliant fashion. Marple placed a beauty but Grudgings responded and Ratby brightened up, but could not pierce their way through the backs. Man to man the Saints were decidedly the better team, and their passing at times was brilliant. After a severe tussle Simpson scored the third point, amidst rounds of applause. Victoria: Ewen, goal; Gamble and Eaers, backs; Bottom, Farrows and Warner, half-backs; Moorhouse, C Cragg, Smith, Halligan and Toone, forwards. The Town won the toss, and had the advantage of the slope. A strong wind blew across the ground, which greatly interfered with the play. The first aggressive movement was made by the Vics, Morris relieved, and the two retaliated. Returning, Moorhouse got down nicely on the right and centred, Smith shot, and Gleeson saved splendidly. Following some midfield play, the Town got away on the left, and Bentley and Paling each tried shots, the latter just missing. at half-time there was no score. On resuming Lowden was early conspicuous for a fine run on the left, but he shot wide. An alteration hereabouts took place in the Town's team, Cragg ging forward, and Bentley taking his place at back. A fruitless corner was gained by the Ton, and the shot by Paling went begging. 

SEMI-FINAL

LOUGHBOROUGH FORET ROVERS v SOUTH WIGSTON ALBION

At last year, these teams met in the semi-final on the Athletic Ground, Loughborough. The match then resulted in a draw, and when it was re-played at Syston, the Rovers won by a goal to none, after two hours pay. Considerable interest was taken in the match, and the visitors had a good following, who were pretty confident of the ability of their players to pull the match off. The Rovers, on the other hand, were quite determined to reach the final again. Wigston won the toss, and kicked towards the railway end with the wind. Plat was at once fast and exciting. The Rovers had the best of the opening stages, and the Albion custodian soon had to defend his charge, which he did creditably on several occasions. The Albion worked their way down, and Norman twice shot over the bar. The Rovers defence was not up to the usual mark, and several dangerous attacks were made by Wigston, but the goal remained intact. Pepper got clean away for the rovers, but hesitated in shooting, and the chance was lost. After about half an hour the Albion attacked strongly again and their efforts were rewarded, a long sharp shot being put in which Holborough handled, but failed to stop. This rexxx the Rovers and Pepper again got clean through, and again made the mistake of keeping the ball too long, with the result that the goalkeeper took it almost off his toes. The Rovers, keeping up the pressure, the Albion goal withstood some strong attacks, Baker on one occasion breaking the side net with a warm shot. Half-time arrived with the score Wigston, 1; Rovers, none. The game resumed with snow falling heavily. Neither side could claim much advantage for a while, but the pace eventually began to tell, and the Albion were the first to feel its effects. The Rovers slowly but surely began to get the weight of their opponent, and the Albions defence was sorely taxed. Bennett got through, and finished with a rattling shot, which just missed the upright. The Albion played a strong defensive game, but their efforts were doomed to fail, for, after twenty-five minutes' plat Clarke took advantage of a neat pass from Bennett, and with a good cross shot completely beat the Albion custodian, who made a god but ineffectual attempt to save, this being received with great enthusiasm. The Rovers played harder than ever, and after the goal had had some narrow escapes, Pepper put the ball through once more, the Albion appeared thoroughly done up, while the Rovers played very strongly. In the closing stages the Albions made a desperate effort but failed to beat the Rovers' defence, and the end came with the score:

#31 PACKINGON v GROBY ALBIONS

Played on the Field Head Ground, Markfield, on Saturday last under the superintendence of Mr. Carpenter. A large gate assembled, the partisans of each combination being confident. Groby won the toss, and tool advantage of the slope, also being materially helped by the wind. Fine play was displayed on both sides, Brools, Groby's full-back, being prominent. Even play was the order of the first 165 minutes. Then Groby rallied, and after a fine run, Jordan, Groby's centre-forward, tried the Packington goalkeeper, who fumbled the ball, thus giving the lead to the Albons. Packington played with much coolness, the centre forward seemed to pass his opponents at will, making rings round them when desired, the wing kept well up, the halves fed well, and the backs were all to be desired, and they were soon on level terms. Marshall, the Albion skipper, played his smarter football, but his men seemed below the mark. Midfield play ruled for a time, until Packington rallied and placed a second goal to their credit. This somewhat disheartened the Groby contingent, and their play fell off considerably, and continued until the whistle blew for right about turn, the score then standing: Packington, two; Groby, one. The game was continued under inclement weather, snow falling briskly, and Groby commenced with ten men, Wood at this time being absent. Packington now had the advantage of position, and soon credited themselves with a third point. Groby had a penalty, but it was badly taken, and they somewhat lost heart, but another penalty was in store for them, and this time F Bennett, by a splendid shot sent the leather home, the score standing at 3-2. Packington did not relish this and almost straight off the xxx took the ball down and passed it through the posts. Packington always appeared to have their opponents at their will, and with the useful lead of two goals steadied themselves. For the last 15 or 20 minutes play was moderately even, and nothing was added to either total. Groby played some exceedingly clever games in the South Leicestershire League competition, but it is only fair to give Packington the credit of being superior on this occasion. In the final Packington will meet the Loughborough team which defeated South Wigston. Result: Packington, four goals; Groby Albion, two goals.

#32 LEICESTERSHIRE SHIELD FINAL

LOUGHBOROUGH FOREST ROVERS v. PACKINGTON

On the Castle Ground, Mountsorrel. There was a good "gate," including a large number from Loughborough, who were hoping to bring the Shield back with them. Packington were a much older and heavier lot than the Rovers, and appeared at first glance likely to carry off the trophy. The Rovers, however, were in fine form, as the result of consistent training, and they were determined to put the finishing touch on last year's performance. Mr E. A. Marson was the referee. Owing to the late arrival of Packington, the game was not commenced until ten minutes past four. The Rovers at once attacked strongly, and Baker got through, and opened the scoring with a splendid shot after 15 minutes play. Packington rallied a little after this early reverse, but they were soon, busy again defending. The Rovers' forwards showed nice combination, and after repeated attacks the Packington goal again fell, Stevens beating Sutton for a second time, within the first ten minutes. Play became more even for a time, Packington going in for long kicking and passing. German, at centre forward, worked hard, but was well looked after by Waldram. Going away again, the Rovers had hard lines in not increasing their score, Pepper shooting on to the bar, and a minute later the same player shot over when in a good position. Packington attacked, and held the sway for a time, Holborough having to save from German and Granger, while several shots went wide. Eventually, a free to the Rovers relieved the pressure, and the Packington goal was again most determinedly attacked, Sutton saving hot shots from Bennett and Clarge in fine style, following which Stevens got hold again and despatched the ball safely into the net for the third goal. Even play followed. Baker had a good opening, but shot out, whilst at the other end Holborough saved a hot shot from German. Half time: Rovers, three; Packington, none. The second half went greatly in favour of the Rovers, who appeared to have their opponents well weighed in. The Packington goal was constantly the scene of exciting incidents, and the goalkeeper had a warm time of it. The whole of the defence played a hard game ; indeed, the undaunted manner in which the whole Packington team played was most commendable, considering the way in which the game was going. Offside spoiled, several of the Rovers' efforts, but eventually from a corner, well placed by Baker, Bennett headed a splendid goal, this making the score 4-0. Close on time Packington made a last effort to get through, but failed, although one shot from, Eaton, which deserved a better fate, went by the post, and time arrived with the Rovers winners by four goals to none. In presenting the Shield, Mr. Marson said that considering the importance of the match he had not officiated in a more gentlemanly game during the whole of his 15 years' experience, and he expressed the hope that if Loughborough could not hold the Shield another year Packington would win it. The team to bring the Shield to Loughborough for the first time was: W. Holborough, goal; H. L. and W. Smith, backs; H. Barker, J. Waldram, and C. Walker, half-backs; J. H. Bennett, A. Clarke, W. Pepper, E. Stevens, and J. Baker forwards. The Rovers have now two League matches to play.
