At a meeting held at the Maypole Hotel in Nottingham in June 1890 under the presidency of Mr F H Celley, of the Sheffield Club., representatives from Doncaster Rovers, Grantham Rovers, Heanor Town, Loughborough, Newark, Notts Jardines, Notts Olympic, Rotherham Swifts (sent a letter agreeing with the subject of the meeting) and Sheffield FC unanimously decided to form an amalgamation of clubs to be called the Midland Football Alliance. The constitution of the new body was based on that of the Midland League. It was decided to invite Notts County Rovers to join the Alliance to make to make 10 clubs. Mr A G Hines was nominated to be hon. sec and a sub committee was formed. By the end of a 2 ½ hour meeting the following week, Notts County Rovers had joined the Alliance, rules were adopted and fixtures for the ensuing season arranged.

Sheffield FC lost every away game.

Runner-up Doncaster Rovers won the Sheffield Challenge Cup.

Grantham Rovers, who finished third won the Kettering Cup for the second time.

Of the 56 matches that counted towards the final standings, all but 11 were brought to a definite conclusion. There were 35 home and just 10 away wins!

Notts County Rovers topped the table for the most weeks, but were replaced by Grantham Rovers and Loughborough, for the odd week or two but in general only when they had played more games.

The Alliance Council, consisting of representatives from each club, met for the first time on Wednesday 28 October to consider several protests. In the case of protests regarding points of play it was decided to uphold the authority of the referee by accepting all decisions. For playing unregistered men against Loughborough and Notts County Rovers respectively, Doncaster rovers and Jardines each forfeited two points. These were the only instances of Midland Football Alliance League rule being broken.

After drawing at home against Jardines in November, which was completed in semi-darkness due to the late arrival of the visitors, Newark protested stating that the game should be count as an Alliance game as it was impossible for the spectators and players to see the play. The Newark committee stating that if games kicked off later than 3 pm during the winter months then there would soon be very few spectators and much dissatisfaction.

Two of the original ten clubs – Notts Jardines and Rotherham Swifts - failed to fulfil their fixtures. Notts Jardines withdrew from the Midland Football Alliance having been suspended by the Football Association for non-payment of a fine. Jardines only won one match, against County Rovers, and even then it lost the 2 points from that win because of fielding an ineligible player. A 3–0 defeat to Loughborough was the last of the 9 matches the Jardines played that season, and, indeed, was the last match the club played in its original incarnation. Given below is the last published league table to include Jardines and Rotherham.

Rotherham Swifts withdrew from the Midland Football Alliance in late December 1890 because they alleged that they could not pay expenses incurred travelling to away matches. The Alliance Committee decided not to accept their resignation, and thus releasing them from further obligations; but to leave it to those clubs who had the expense of going to Rotherham, to appeal against the English Association.

Jardines were suspended by Football Association for the non-payment of a fine.

At the meeting of the Alliance Committee on 17 April 1891 it was decided that Rotherham and Jardine results should be deduced and that the Champions should be presented with a trophy.

Nine of the Alliance clubs entered the English Cup competition, Notts County Rovers being the exception, and only two, Newark, Notts Jadine and Loughborough reached the third round. Notts Olympic and Sheffield went out in the first round, and Grantham scratched, whilst Heanor, Doncaster and Rotherham Swifts went out in the second round. Newark were disqualified after beating Belper 3-1 at home. Loughborough were the only team to get through to the fourth round after beating Belper 6-2 away from home. In the third round. Jardines were eliminated by Long Eaton Rangers (4-1). Sheffield United were Loughborough's opposition in the fourth and final qualifying round, where they were outplayed by the Yorkshire team eventually losing 6-1 at Bramall-lane. Doncaster and Loughborough both resigned at the end of the 1890-91 season after being accepted into the Midland League. Their places along with the vacancies created by withdrawal of Notts Jardines and Rotherham Swifts were taken by Derby County Wanderers, Lincoln City Swifts, Long Eaton Athletic and Mansfield Town.

Note: Although all results have been found, the scores of two games are currently not known. The Notts County Rovers home match against Notts Olympic originally scheduled for late December was postponed. The date and score of the rearranged fixture despite considerable research has yet to be found. Similarly, the encounter between Sheffield and Notts Olympic had to be rearranged. It appears that it had not taken place by late April, but League tables published in May suggest that the game did take place and that it ended in a score draw. This however, has yet to be verified.

Loughborough and the Midland Football Alliance League

At the end of the 1889-90 season Loughborough had agreed to join the recently formed Leicestershire Football Senior League, but just the ink was drying, they resigned and instead accepted an offer to join the Midland Alliance League. The lure of top-class opposition such as Doncaster Rovers, Rotherham Swifts, Sheffield FC, and Notts County clearly swayed them, although the decision no doubt annoyed many in the Leicestershire Association. The Luffs Committee knew that to both attract supporters and to stand any chance of being successful, they had to strengthen their squad. They signed William Freestone (Notts Mapperley), John Plackett (Long Eaton) and Valentine Smith (Notts Swifts). At 3:10 pm 21 September 1890 Loughborough became the first Leicestershire club to play in a league competition when they faced Doncaster Rovers away in the Midland Alliance League at the Intake Ground. Originally it was called the "Deaf and Dumb Ground" as it was located on field rented from the Yorkshire Institute for the Deaf and Dumb. There were no dressing rooms and the players changed at a nearby hostelry, either the Rockingham Arms or the Doncaster Arms. So, although they were moving up a class in opposition, the same cannot be said for quality of the amenities. Luffs playing with the strong wind that blew diagonally across field, failed to score in the first period. In the second half Doncaster made the most of weather conditions, netting four times, although the final score of 4-0, rather flattered the Yorkshiremen. A defeat also away from home the following weekend, again in Yorkshire, this time in Sheffield, was followed by the Luffs first victory, at Notts Jardine. The Luffs drew their first-ever home league game, 3-3 against Heanor on 18 October, with William Lowe having the honour of scoring the club's first home goal in the Midland Alliance. November yield just 3 points from four games, which made what followed remarkable. Due to awful weather, the black and whites first game in December did not take place until five days before Christmas when they slaughtered Sheffield FC 7-2. This result sparked a run of six consecutive wins that sent them to the top of the league for the entire month of January. The run ended at home to the eventual Champions, Notts County Reserves on St Valentine's Day. Sadly, they lost two of their remaining three games to finish in 3rd place, on 18 points after winning 7, losing 5 and drawing 2 of their 14 league games. Nevertheless, a more than satisfactory first season.

Loughborough left the Midland Alliance League to join the Midland League along with arch-rivals Leicester Fosse

The Midland Alliance only ran for two further seasons. Derby County Wanderers were crowned champions in 1891-92 and Derby Town in 1892-93.

DONCASTER ROVERS v. LOUGHEDROUGH.

These clubs met on the Intake at Dencaster on Saturday afternoop under the Midland Counties Alliance. A strong wind blew across the ground diagonally, and interfered considerably with the play. Loughborough won the toss, and elected to take the advantage of the wind in the first half. They falled to score, however, and in the second half, with the wind against them, they were completely over-matched, and the game ended in favour of the Rovers by four goals to nil. The vinitors backs fell off considerably as play proceeded, whilst the Rovers' forwards, purificularly after having registered their first goal, developed an amount of dash not often equalled in the Doncaster Club. Frost, Hawksworth, and Gresham may be particularly mentioned in this connection. Both wings in the Loughborough team put in some good, useful, and clever work, and Plackett played a grand game at half-back.

Kisby kicked off for Doncaster at ten minutes past three, and when players had settled down to their work Loughborough, assisted by the wind, got among their opponents, and looked like making it rather hot for them, but Gray relieved with a good kick, and the ball eventually went out over the goal line at the Loughborough end. From the goal kick Plackett cloverly centred, and a creditable attempt was made by the Loughborough forwards to register a point, but Gray came to the rescue, and through the combined efforts of Hoyle, Herrod, and Gresham play was transferred to the other end, where the referree ruled an appeal that Gresham fouled. Play was continued, and the ball soon went over the line, avoiding any disputes. Herrod thes played offside when Doncaster seemed to have a chance, after which play again settled down in the Rovers quarters, and once or twice Masay was called on to fist out, which feat he accomplished in fine style-Kelham and Coliman both made creditable attempts to score. James headed away another shot. Lungton, who had been playing a sound game in aptic of his unsoundness of limb, missed for once, and James stopped what bid fair to be a dangerous analought on the Rovers' goal. Herrod, Hoyle, and Gresbam, who played well together with pretty short passing, were responsible for working the ball towards the victors' goal, but it was not allowed to remain there long, for it was speedily carried down the other side by Kelham and Cross, and Plackett nearly scored with a long shot, which Langion just managed to step, and the ball eventoally went out. Possession was then taken by Gray, who payed to Langion, who in his turn passed to Hawksworth, who had a chance, but kicked over. The home backs were soon appealed to again, and

they were there when wanted, returning ball after ball carried over by the wind, and taken down by the still more dangerous short passing system. Langion bereabouts was particularly conspicuous, and was greeled with the cheering "Good old Langten" more than once. Half-time, however, was called without any score. Having prevented their appearants scoring with the advantage of the wind, the novers scitted down to the second half with an evident intention of winning. Herrod's was the first attempt, the ball actually going through, but he was clearly off-side. Langton kicked from mid-field to before the goal, but the ball was got away, and went outside. From a subsequent throw to Front centred, and Hemingfield had a chance which he falled to utilise. After some give and take play Hoyle took the ball up and passed to Herrod, who scored with a beautiful long low shot. The forwards followed up by a rush, and Hemmingfield and Frost sent in stinging shots, which were luckily headed out by the backs or fisied away by Ward, who made a fine display. This performance was shortly afterwards repeated, subsequently to which Loughborough had a brief look in. Then the ball was again worked as into the Loughborough quarters, and after a bit of neat passing amongst the forwards Gresham saw his opportunity and took advantage of it, scoring the second goal for Doncaster. On restarting, play was for a time in midfield, and then Prosa and Hawkaworth worked up, the former centring and the ball being headed through by Kisby, making the third point. The Hovers continued their aggressive measures to the end of the chapter, the fourth goal being registered by Frost. Gray had placed the half well in front of goal, and a scrimmage ensued, in the midst of which

LOUGHBOROUGH V. NOTTS JARDINES.—Continuing their victorious career, the Loughborough players defeated the Jardines on Saturday by three goals to nil. The ground was too hard and slippery to allow of anything like good form, and often during the game what appeared to be promises of good points were missed by the players having a difficulty in keeping their feet. Freestone kicked off, and was met by a smart response from the Jardines, who, rushing the ball down, secured a corner. Another corner followed to the same players, but Loughborough clearing, a good run by Lowe took the ball near the opposite goal, Kelham shooting too high. This was succeeded by another attack from Loughborough, a good shot by Kelham shaking the cross-bar, and though the pressure was maintained the Jardines' backs eventually cleared. An "off-side" goal for the visitors was recorded, and the game which up to now had been rather slow showed signs of improvement. The Jardines, however, though they played but 10 men, proved themselves worthy the mettle of the home players. Twenty minutes from the start, a remarkably good goal was obtained by Loughborough. Lowe and Smith, by smartly dodging the half-backs, succeeded in obtaining a chance for Smith, who put in a capital cross shot which, as it was just passing the goal mouth, was rushed through by Kelham. On resuming, a capital chance was placed for Freestone, who, after he had passed through the backs with the aid of Lowe, shot wide. The Jardines played up well, Jarvis particularly giving his opponents plenty to do, but the dangerous state of the ground was against them all. At half-


time Loughborough led by one goal to nil. When the game restarted the Jardines made a capital start, the attack using maintained until Loughborough cleared. Then they commenced to press until Carter, having the ball within gasy distance, sent in a fine shot, which passed just over the crossbar. The ball having passed back again, a tricky shot from Lowe compelled Shaw to concede a corner. But neither from this, nor farm an easy chance in the hands of Kelham—who had exchanged positions with Freestone—did Loughborough succeed in adding to their points. The visitors having had a look in, which ought to have resulted in a goal, the play became slow again, until Smith, receiving the ball from the left wing, sent in one of his fine fast shots, which, after making an upright tremble, passed through the posts, Shaw being powerless to save.
