The fourth Midland League season saw the number of clubs increase to thirteen, after Kettering, Mansfield Tn and Newark were successful in their application to join the league. Mansfield Town and Newark had competed in the Midland Football Alliance in 1891-92 and Kettering joined the Midland League to compete in a league competition for the first time.

Rotherham Town were the firm favourites to retain their Midland League title prior to the start of the season. They began the season with three straight wins, all by some margin. Doncaster provided an early indication that they might be able to compete with their Yorkshire rivals after an opening run that saw them win their first four games but their subsequent form resulting in them failing to win again before the New Year

.

As he season progressed only Loughborough and Burton offered any opposition to Rotherham's quest to become the first team in Midland League history to retain the title. Leicester Fosse showed some improvement after their last place finish the previous season but their overall form was of a staccato nature.

A measure of Rotherham's dominance is illustrated by the fact that runners-up, Burton Wanderers only lost once in fifteen matches, up to a final day defeat, and yet still ended the season 7 points adrift of the eventual champions. Fourth place Leicester ended 6 points behind Loughborough in third place, 14 points

behind Rotherham. The champions only suffered defeat on two occasions – a very surprising 4-0 success for newcomers Kettering just prior to Christmas and Burton Wanderers.

Rotherham averaged more than 3 goals pe game, and only failed to score on one occasion – against Kettering! Charlie Leatherbarrow scored 26 times, to become the first Midland League player to score more than 20 in a season. Albert Carnelly scored 19 for Loughborough and became the first player to end the season as one of the top three goal scorers in two consecutive seasons.

Derby Junction, the only amateur club in the league, finished bottom and dropped out of the league at the end of the season. Mansfield, Newark, Long Eaton Rangers and Wednesbury Old Athletic ended long hard seasons. Former champions and runners-up twelve months ago finished 6th.

Rotherham were accepted into the ever-expanding Football League. Before the next season Wednesbury Old Athletic also ended their association with the Midland League, primarily due to financial issues, that ultimately resulting in the club folding completely.

During the close season Fosse significantly strengthened their squad with the acquisition of goalkeeper Jimmy Thraves from Notts County and winger William "Billy" Dorrell from Singers. Thraves played for County in the 1891 FA Cup Final, losing 3-1 to Blackburn Rovers in front of 23,000 spectators at the Kensington Oval and played against the Fosse in the final game staged at Mill Lane. William 'Billy' Dorrell was scouted by Leicester Fosse playing for Singer's in Coventry, and replaced Jimmy Atter, Fosse's leading scorer in 1891-92 on the left-wing. A firm favorite with the fans, his dribbling and "trickery" attracted the attention of Aston Villa who he joined for £250 in May 1894. He scored five goals in 11 First Division appearances for Villa and was allowed to move back to the Fosse in March 1896. During his second spell with the Fosse, he scored 24 goals in 63 appearances.

Loughborough also made a number of "star" signings, William Sharpe (from Ardwick), John Start (Long Eaton Ranger), Charles Butterworth (Derby County), Jack Kent (Everton) and Thomas Culley (Birmingham St Georges). Outside left for two of Luffs Midland League seasons, Sharpe scored 6 goals, before being transferred to serve Division Two side Woolwich Arsenal. John Start joined his brother, striker, Frank for just one season at the Athletic Grounds, netting an impressive 11 goals in his 20 Midland League games for the club. Opera singing outside left Charles Butterworth also spent just one season at the Luffs where he was one short of being ever-present. Unfortunately, as we shall see Jack Kent's time in Leicestershire was not a happy one, twice breaking his leg, the latter (against the Fosse) so severe that it ended his playing career. The final signing Thomas Culley, although scoring in Loughborough's opening two wins of the season, made little impact after that.

Both clubs started the season full of hope and enthusiasm. For perhaps the first time in the Fosse's history, they had a place they could call home, allowing them to concentrate on building a top-class team. Fosse started the season with two defeats at Mansfield (4-1) and Rotherham (6-1), before drubbing Newark 7-1 at Walnut Street, with Slack scoring a hat-trick. Jimmy Thraves missed his train connection and turned up 35 minutes late for his debut against Mansfield Town. His place in goal being taken by William "Kiddy" Lowe, who conceded three goals whilst waiting for the arrival of a very embarrassed Thraves. Lowe scored Fosse's consolation goal. Thraves made amends making 148 consecutive appearances for the Fosse and in the process becoming a club legend. Two 4-0 wins away at Kettering and at home to Derby Junction led up to the first Championship of Leicestershire game of the season. Loughborough's form leading up to the derby game was patchy, winning 2, losing 2 and drawing 2. The highlight was a 6-0 slaughter of Mansfield Town the week before the eagerly awaited clash with Leicester on 14 November 1893. Fosse supporters turned up in hundreds to Loughborough. In addition to the crowds that came by train, numerous horse-drawn four

wheeled carriages conveyed Leicester people in the hope to see their team win. Rain fell in the morning making the ground very slippy. Although previous encounters between the Fosse and the Luffs had been "rough-charging, bullying battles", this encounter was a display of scientific football and was so as much in contrast to the old-time days as one can conceive. Sadly, for the Fosse faithful the outcome was the same – losing to their arch rivals - 2-1! Early exchanges were even until William Freestone scored for Loughborough. Slack should have equalised almost immediately but shot wide. Carnelly scored a second for the Luffs with a great strike. Fosse shooting was poor. But just before the whistle sounded for half-time Slack pulled a goal back. Play was fast and furious and end-to end, Loughborough having the best of the play forcing Thraves to make several outstanding saves. Howevr, there can be no doubt that Loughborough were the best team on the day – and hence still the Champions of Leicestershire. For energy, individual skill, combination, and strategy they were more than one goal superior to the Fosse. Perhaps the Fosse were a little below par. But as with most games there were always many "ifs" and 'buts". "If" Webb had only shot straighht for goal as he should have done; "if" the referree had ruled Loughborough's first goal off-side, as many spectators thought then the Fosse could have won the game. "But" if any other Midland League goalkeeper but Traves had been in goal, then Loughborough would surely scored heavily.

Fosse entertained their archrivals in the reverse Midland League fixture in March 1892 in what local newspaper reporters described as "one of the best games ever played in the Midland League". The weather was bright, but there was a keen wind. Loughborough had the best of an even game, Start scoring past Thraves in the first half. The Fosse made desperate efforts to equalise before losing the advantage of the wind, but Slack threw away their only real chance. Restarting the "Luffs" had both the wind and sun in their favour, and for the first five minutes they attacked almost continuously. In a rare excursion Start was given the ball and after a fast run he centred beautifully, Dorrell missed the ball, but Hardy with a crisp shot scored a magnificent goal. The Fosse fans went wild, cheering frantically, and the Fosse thus encouraged made further onslaughts on their opponents' goal. Loughborough replied vigorously, with Carnelly almost scoring with a low shot. The game became fast and wonderfully even. After a couple of successive unproductive corners, their attack gradually weakened and the recently introduced strict training regime of the Fosse team began to tell. Playing with great dash and flair Fosse forwards kept the Luffs defence actively employed, who were more than up to the task. Urged on by their respective fans, both teams pressed hard, but to no avail, the game ending 1-1.

The first Championship Match was played at Leicester on Thursday evening and attracted a good crowd of between 300-4000. The weather was fairly disruptive and shortly after the game had kicked off there was a heavy downpour and "violent thunderstorm" ensued, which resulted in the players rushing off the field and taking shelter util the storm subsided.

The game was won fairly convincing by the midland League team and the champions were on the defensive for most of the match, with their fill backs Harry Thicket and Percy Watson being singled out for their excellent defensive work, despite the defeat. The second goal for the Midland League was scored by Alvert Carnelly, came from a "magnificent shot."

Laye in the game, a collision between Jack Kent and Charlie Leatherburrow resulted in Kent being carried from the field. It was later discovered he had broken his leg. This incident was an unfortunate one for Kent, who was originally only drafted in to play after the withdrawal of Gainsborough defender Cookson. Eight of the Midland League team had played for, or were to play for, clubs in the Football League
