THE AMATEUR ASSOCIATION CUP.

FINAL TIE AT LEEDS.

OLD CARTHUSIANS v. MIDDLESBROUGH.

The ground of the Leeds Club was honoured to-day by being the rendezvous for the final tie for the Amateur Association Cup between the Old Carthusians and Middlesbrough teams. It will be remembered that a fortnight ago the Carthusians, who are the holders of the Cup, played the semi-final tie on the same ground with South Bank, and the support accorded to that event by Leeds people was so satisfactory that the Council of the Football Association decided to give the "S cker" game a further fillip in the West Riding by arranging for the final tie in the competition to be also played on the Headingley enclosure. Last year, the first year of the competition, the final was decided at Richmond, when the Old Charterhouse boys defeated the Caruals by two goals to one. This season the Old Carthusians have played a most consistent game, and after their defeat of Crewe Alexandra managed to win against South Bank upon the second time of asking. Fresh from their victory over South Bank however, the Old Boys engaged in the final of the London Charity Cup on Tuesday last sgainst the London Caledonians, and were defeated by the Scotsmen by three goals to one. The London Caledonians played with by far greater dash than their opponents, who appeared somewhat the worse for their recent exertions. Middlesbrough, the Old Charterhouse men's opponents to-day, were the only amateur club in the competition proper of the English Cup, and had disposed of their opponents in the Amateur Cup in good style, including the Old Westminsters at Wembley Park. The teams travelled to Leeds this morning, the Londoners leaving town at 9.45 a.m. by G.N.R. express, and making the Great Northern Hotel their headquariers. The kick off was fixed for 3.30, when, in spite of the rain and cold weather, there was a fair attendance, and numbers of the public were still coming into the ground. The wind was blowing across the ground, and gave little advantage to the side winning the tass. The Old Carthusians won the spin. The Northerners started the game. They attacked at once, and before the game was a minute old Bach sent in a hot shot which Wilkinson had to fist out. Pretty passing by Broadbent on the old scholar side earned impartial cheers, and was the means of giving the Carthusians some advantage, and Smith shot in at goal without success. Then the Northerners had a short turn at attacking, but to no purpose, and Wilson was mainly instrumental in the scholars getting close to the Middleshrough goal.
