Nearly three years after the collapse of the Leicestershire Football League, a meeting between representatives of different clubs of Leicestershire and Northamptonshire was held on Thursday 22 February 1894 at the Robin Hood Hotel, Gallowtree Gate, Leicester.

"In explaining the aim of the meeting Mr T S Ashmole, honorary secretary of the Leicestershire Association said they all knew that in these days of Leagues and Combinations continuous rounds of friendly matches did not draw sufficiently to sustain the interest in them throughout the season. It had therefore occurred to him that by combining the clubs of Leicestershire and Northamptonshire an interesting league might be formed, which would not only improve the football of the district but also produce a better balance sheet for the different clubs concerned at the end the season. Four Northamptonshire clubs had been invited -Rushden, Finedon, Wellingborough and Kettering. The latter two named clubs were represented at the meeting and with regard to Rushden and Finedon he had notified that each of those clubs had promised to join a projected Southern League, but if that organisation was into successfully formed then they would be glad to join this one. A Southern League was talked of and even organised last year [1893], but it then fell through, and from information he had received he did not think the new one would be carried. The Chairman [Mr Utting (Kegworth St Andrew's)] said although Leicestershire was well to the fore in Association Football, they were a little behind with regard to league football. He suggested that, owing to the inconvenience of travelling between North Leicestershire and Northamptonshire, a northern and a southern league should be formed. Mr Ashmole thought the difficulty could be overcome by a judicious arrangement of the fixture list to meet the train service. A suggestion was made to turn the Leicestershire Senior Cup into a league, but Mr Ashmole said he didn't think there were sufficient clubs of good standing and strength in Leicestershire to make an interesting league. A few clubs would quickly rise in the table, and interest would wane towards the

end of the season. Mr Hawkins (Hinckley Town) proposed that the projected league should be formed which was seconded by Mr Stapleton (Loughborough). In the course of discussions Mr Ashmole said the question of professionalism would not enter into the composition of the league as they would merely choose the senior clubs of the county. Of course, it would not be in the interests of either Fosse or Loughborough to play their first teams. Mr Lambert (Castle Donington) said his club was not opposed to the principle of the league the thing would experience great difficulty in getting home from matches. Mr Jordan said Shepshed were in favour of a league confined to Leicestershire. After further discussion, Mr Hawkins moved that in case the Northamptonshire clubs cannot join the league, a combination be formed of Leicestershire clubs only. This was agreed to, no one objected. Under the proposal of Mr. Lee seconded by Mr Woollerton, a sub committee consisting of Messrs Utting, Hawkins, Lee, Stapleton, Orchin, and Boot was appointed to further the matter and Mr Ashmole was chosen hon secretary pro temp." *-Leicester Dail Post – 23 February 1894*

In the end only three Northamptonshire teams joined the Leicestershire and Northamptonshire Football League – Kettering Town Reserves, Wellingborough and Finedon Revellers. As eight Leicestershire clubs - Fosse Rovers, Hinckley, Hugglescote Robin Hood, Leicester YMCA, Loughborough Athletic, Melton Town, Sileby Rangers and Shepshed Town entered, three-quarters of the matches took place in that county. A ninth Leicestershire club – Castle Donington – unfortunately withdrew from the proposed League in May 1894 due to issues with the local train service. Attempts to induce other Northamptonshire clubs, in particular Kettering Hawks, to enter, failed.

League rules, and the fixture list were agreed in May 1894.

The Leicestershire and Northants League (LNL) was formed without the formal consent of Leicestershire Football Association. This caused some animosity between the two organisations. The situation was made worse when LNL clubs were informed that League games should take priority cup games. The first League games were played on Saturday 1 September 1894 on the Athletic Grounds, Loughborough between Loughborough Athletic, the reserve team of Loughborough FC and Hugglescote Robin Hood. A onesided encounter, ended with an easy 7-1 win for the home side.

When matches were postponed through inclement weather or the ruling of a referee as to the unfitness of the ground, and no gate being taken, the visitors were to receive traveling expenses for the second visit. All three League games scheduledfor 2 February – Leicester YMCA v Melton Town, Hugglescote Robin Hood v Wellingborough and Hinckley Town v Kettering, all of which were postponed on account of the bad condition of the grounds.

The championship match between Leicester Fosse and the Rest of the League was played at Kettering on Good Friday. A special half-day train excursion were run from Leicester, Leicester Fosse Rovers were presented with gold centre silver medals and the Rest of the League players with silver medals at the end of the game.



This old notice of a football match played on Loughborough's Athletic Ground in 1894 was brought to light when a wall was uncovered during alterations to the Cattle Market premises of George Hill in 1958, in the area of town of Stuart Westmoreland's opposite the Town Hall passage. Note that it was printed by H. Wills, later to become Wills & Hepworth of Ladybird Books fame.

All League games were completed. Several matches were postponed or abandoned mainly due to inclement weather. The onset of darkness caused several games to be terminated before time and were replayed at a later date.

Leicester Fosse Rovers won the inaugural Leicestershire & Northamptonshire League, winning 17, drawing one and losing 2 games. It was clear from the first weeks of the season that the Fosse were the best team and topped the table throughout the whole season. They won their opening 14 LNL games, dropping their first points in a draw against Wellingborough at home in late March 1895. Both defeats took place in the final two weeks of the season – YMCA at home and away at Wellingborough. Five points behind were Finedon Revellers Melton Town claimed the wooden spoon winning just 2 of their 20 League games, conceding on average 5 goals per game.

Impudent Fraud on the Railway Company by Footballers. — John Hopewell and Wm. Chas. Hopewell, labourers, Kegworth, were charged with travelling on the Midland Railway at Sileby without having paid their fares on January 12.- Mr. Turner (Messrs. Beale and Co., solicitors to the Midland Railway Company) prosecuted, and asked the Bench to impose a heavy fine in view of the serious nature of the case. The defendant John was employed at Long Eaton and his-brother at Nottingham. Both defendants were football players, and on the day in question they were to play for Sileby Rangers at Leicester. They travelled from Kegworth to Sileby without obtaining tickets, and on the way were joined by the secretary of the club, who gave them excursion tickets from Sileby to Leicester. A detective of the railway company, who was travelling in the same compartment, gave information to the stationmaster at Sileby. Mr. Turner added that he was sorry he had not got the secretary of the club before the Court for aiding and abetting in this fraud, which bad no doubt been perpetrated before. - Defendants pleaded guilty, and asked to be dealt with leniently. — The magistrates imposed a fine of 20s. on each defendant, or seven days in default, the Chairman remarking that he hoped the case would act as a warning to others.

The Robin Hood journeyed to Loughborough on Saturday to meet Athletic FC in the Leicestershire and Northants League. The Robin Hood commenced operations from the Nottingham-road end and after a few minutes the home team attacked, pressing sharply, Ottey having to run out in order to save. The Athletics returned again, and secured a corner, which was not improved upon. The visitors then retaliated, and a corner was given, after which the game became open. About 20 minutes from the start, Preston succeeded in scoring the first goal for the Athletic, who then had the best of play for a while. The visitors showed good combination, but their opponents overwhelmed them by the vigour and dash of their attack. A clever rush by Robin Hood followed, and they nearly scored, but the ball went over the bar. The "Luffs" had a more narrow escape directly after, when the ball struck the bar from a nice screw shot. Preston then scored another goal with a low fast shot from a centre from the left. Nothing further was done up to half time when the score was:-

Athletic 2 Hugglescote 0

Resuming, the home team opened the attack, and after about five minutes made a hot rush on the Hugglescote goal. Ottey defended well, and the ball was nearly lost, but Tucker put it through. Two penalty kicks "hands" were given against the visitors, and then Preston scored the fourth goal for the Town. Williamson sent over the bar, and immediately after Kidger ran the ball down, and the former shot in. Ottey stopped the leather, but Williamson was on it at once, and passed it over his head into the net. Another rush was then made on the Hugglescote goal, and though Ottey staved off the first shot, he could not stop Kidger's kicks. The Robin's goal-keeper saved a sharp high shot from Willamson, and the visitors ran up the field, Coulton having to stop a shot from the left. #4 HINCKLEY TOWN v HUGGLESCOTE ROBIN HOOD

Hinckley journeyed to Hugglescote on Saturday to play off their first engagement in the Leicestershire and Northants League. Their opponents were the Robin Hood of Hugglescote. The teams representing the two towns have played home and away matches for several seasons past, and the games have always given rise to even well-fought encounters. Last year, two drawn were played. Both clubs have infused new blood into the teams, Hugglescote securing the services of Ellis and James, of Loughborough and making other alterations in their team. Saturday's team was the same as met the Fosse Rovers the previous week, except that Heywood kept goal instead of Ottley. Hinckley also had a change of custodians. Cassaday was expected to take his pace between the sticks, but for some cause failed to put in an appearance. Parnell was therefore placed between the uprights, and Carter played as right half-back. Wale appeared in the team though evidently unprepared for play. He took the position of inside left, Watts playing outside. Wale was apparently still suffering from the injury to leg, received at Hinckley on the previous Saturday, and was of no assistance to the forwards whatever.

Play was fixed to commence at 3,30, but a heavy shower of rain delayed operations for a quarter of an hour. During the first half the visitors had the slope wind their favour. After a spell of mid-play, James raced down the left wing, but Carter stopped him cleverly and gave to Lucas, who speedily got the ball down and put in a nice centre. This was cleared, and then Carter sent in long shot, which Heywood fisted out. Watts, Rickus, and Lucas next participated in a good run, but the ball was put behind. James came away again, but Perry robbed Moore. A free kick then given in favour of Hinckley and good play by Rickus and Lucas the latter gave Heywood a handful, which he coolly disposed of. The home side pressed for a time, Garratt and Wortley being hard work in warding off attacks by Ellis on the right. James caused Parnell to handle, and then a series of throws-in occurred the left all in favour of the homesters. Perry pulled Ellis and gave to Hickinbottom, who showed good play. Lucas centred, but the backs cleared. Rickus and Lucas were again conspicuous on the right, and Lucas centred capitally. Hickinbottom received ball, and just shaved the post on the wrong side. Good passing play by Ellis, Poole and James brought the ball in front of the Hinckley goal, where Ellis put in a grounder, which Parnell did well to get rid of. Poole caused the custodian to throw out a moment afterwards. Hinckley attacked, but Tivey cleared, and Ellis and King made a fast run, the ball going into touch. From the throw-in Rickus headed to Lucas who passed on to Hickinbottom. An anxious time followed for home side, but at length Heywood threw out. The visitors continued to attack and after 16 minutes' play, Rickus scored with low shot. Rickus had followed ball from his own wing to the left, and passed to Hickinbottom, who returned, and Rickus banged it through, drawing first blood. This success roused the home side, and the ball was soon in front of Parnell who two saved good shots. The custodian was rather too anxious and running out, left the goal at the mercy of the Robin Hood, but Carter cleared just in nick of time, The home continued to have best of matters. The ball was well worked up by James and Moore and sent across to Ellis whose shot was intercepted by Perry. Play degenerated somewhat, and then the home side again has most of the play, the Hinckley defence being severely tested. Ellis made a number of good runs and shots and James also very active on the left wing. The Hinckley backs however proved equal to the occasion. Watts ran the ball from one end of the ground to the other, but found the home defence sound, and the ball was quickly at the Hinckley end. Just before half-time the visitors improved, and Hickinbottom was pulled for offside in good position. Both were visited, but half-time announced stood:-

Ellis raced down, and Garratt kicked out The Hinckley right wing were next active, and Ellis another smart run for the home side. Soon after, Ellis put in a wild shot and Moore robbed by Wortley in good position. The leather returned, and Moore equalised with grounder. Ellis had an opening moment later but made erratic shot, and Poole also shot over bar. King made good run, beating Spencer and Perry, but Carter received his centre. Hickinbottom showed up well and passing to Lucas, that winger in shot a foot off the post. Lucas seen making for goal again a moment later, and steadying himself about dozen yards from goal in shot which completely beat Heywood. There were still 25 minutes left for play. The Robin Hood were urged on by their supporters, and they made spirited effort to equalise. Garratt pulled up Ellis, and Lucas made another good run. Both goals were visited in turn Hickinbottom, showing good play for visitors. Parnell saved a warm shot and then the Town right wing went up the ground. Lucas gave to Rickus and he passed on to Hickinbottom who put the ball through for third time. An appeal for offside was disallowed. After rushing ball about a foot the wrong side of the post, the Hinckley centre again did the trick, Lucas passing to his partner, who banged across to Watts, this player centreing to Hickinbottom who lowered home colours for fourth time. Both teams were well represented, each having the assistance of several of last year's first team Smith made his first appear after illness, and Hughes, Lloyd and Priestman also played. Fosse won the toss, and played towards the railway goal, thus having the advantage of a strong breeze. Kettering kicked off, had much the best of the opening exchanges, several times looked dangerous, but the backs managed on each occasion to clear, and the threatened danger was averted. Fosse then attacked and Hughes sent in a beautiful shot, which struck the crossbar. A minute later a free was granted to the home team for hands just in front goal. Lord took the kick and sent the ball to Hughes, who at once rushed it through. Hughes badly fouled one of his opponents, and by the aid of the free kick Kettering attacked strongly, Panter soon equalising. An appeal was made for off-side, but the referee refused to allow it. The Rovers worked their way to the visitors' goal, and Rice shot, but missed the net by several yards. Kettering then had a turn, but the defence was sound, Thompson and Chappell being equally prominent. After a spell of mid-field play, Fosse began to press, but Narroway spoilt their efforts by a wild kick. The same

Later on, however, a nice bit of combination was seen in front of the Shepshed goal, the ball being headed about in bewildering fashion, until Turner directed the leather into the net. Shepshed came away with the goal-kick, and played up better, Kidger sending in a straight shot at Picken, but the latter kicked safely away. Brown eventually came away, and more nice play in front of the Shepshed goal was seen; Turner sent in a long shot, which Martin fisted out, though Tyler again headed straight in, but the Shepshed goal-keeper played up resolutely, and saved two or three sharp shots in quick succession. Relief was brought by Mills, Tyler returned to the attack, but sent two successive shots rather wide of the net. Rain fell heavily through the greater part of the game. A good deal of interest centred in the first appearance of Milliken for the Fosse. Fosse started and the forwards at once got down, but Brown relieved. and with a good run took the ball right up to the

Fosse goal. His shot, however, was a weak one, and Chappell had no difficulty in clearing. The game for a time was very even, each goal-keeper being called upon in turn to save. Then the Fosse commenced to attack, and the Y.M.C.A. goal had several narrow escapes. Pickard once grazing the post with a fast shot. When these teams met a short time ago in Wellingborough the YM lost by one goal to three. H Drage kicked off for the visitors but the ball was soon returned by T M Brown and Jacques made a good shot a goal, which, however, was saved, and play was taken to the centre of the field. For some time the visitors seemed to have the best of matters, but a foul by one of their players gave the home team a chance of again acting on the aggressive, a shot at goal however going over. On Saturday, although Finedon were without the services of Henfrey, Robinson and Clipstone, they played one of their best games of the season, and won a very fast game by three goals to one. *Northampton Mercury – 18 January 1895*

#61 FOSSE ROVERS v SILEBY RANGERS

This Leicestershire and Northants League match was played on the Walnut-street Ground; before a large number of spectators. The Rovers up to the present have not known defeat in this competition, having proved successful on ten occasions, whilst their opponents for the match under notice have contested eight games and have failed to gain a win. Little fear was therefore entertained of their country friends bringing about their defeat, the going was in a fair condition, considering the continued frost. Twenty minutes after the advertised time, a start of made, Lord not being favoured in the spin of the coin, Miller kicked off for the Fosse who immediately made tracks for their opponents goal, the Fosse front string attacking in earnest. After some pretty passing on the part of Miller, Priestman, and Pickard, the latter shot over. Sileby broke

away, getting near the home goal but offside play spoilt a good opening. Pickard on the left got away, and from his centre Hopewell had to concede a corner, from which nothing more than a goal kick resulted. From the kick, Thompson return the ball, and Lord, lying up well, landed in beauty into the left, for which he received the usual applause. Sileby again broke away, Thompson stopped their good intentions and the leather was soon being banged about in front of visitors goal as the outcome of which an offside goal was scored. Davis, Lord, and Hughes were in fair form, keeping the forwards well fed, and they were thus enabled to keep the ball continually in the visitors half. Miller shot at goal, but Rowson, in attempting to save, fell, but Priestman gave the ball a finishing touch, scoring number two for the Rovers. The next feature was a corner conceded to the Fosse, and from Pickard's flag kick a free was awarded the homesters for an infringement, but Millers kick, from a good position in front of goal, was a miserable failure, A shot from Narraway soon after had no better effect. Fosse were having matters all their own way, and from a fine centre by Millikan, Miller no difficulty in beating Yates for the third. Priestman, Narraway, and Miller were next conspicuous with a pretty forward movement, Davis's final shot missing by few inches Rodgers and Wood carried the ball to the Fosse goal, but it was quickly back in his home quarters. The Rangers, although they occasionally attacked, were never really dangerous, the home defence being too good for them. The Rovers were now having hard lines, as they have several good opportunities, but failed when in front of goal kicks by Narraway and Priestman just missing. Hopewell placed his side in an advantageous position, gave nicely to Wood, who spoilt by chance score. Half-time arriving soon after with the score:

On crossing, Fisher sent the ball in motion, and the Rovers soon took of the aggressive, Yates having to save from good attempt by Narraway and Milliken. Rovers were evidently bent on increasing their score, and they kept up a continued bombardment of the visitors citadel. Lord, Narraway, Miller, Milligan show me some pretty foot work. Subsequently G Wood ran down the left wing, but speedily Thompson transferred the ball to midfield where Milliken got possession, and dribbled down, and Yates making a poor attempt to save, Narraway rushed the ball into the net. The Rangers, however, at length made their presence felt. F. Rodgers and E. Wood making a splendid run, although Fisher failed to score from E. Wood's centre, G. Wood was up, and with the lightning shot beat Chappell and did the needful. This aroused the young Fossils for they were not long before they swarmed around the Rangers goal. Nothing tangible resulted, Narraway and Milliken missing grand opportunities when they had the goal at their mercy. After a period of play which was principally confined to the forwards, Milliken was given another chance of atoning his previous fails, but he fared no better, his shot going over the bar. The Rovers were applauded for their combination, and although they were time after time within an ace of scoring, through weaknesses in front of goal they failed to put the ball in his right place. The frequent attacks keeping Yates employed while Chappell was rarely visited. The monotony was last broken, the home forwards playing up in a most determined manner, and Pickard with the assistance of Miller, added the fifth goal. #68 YMCA v HUGGLESCOTE ROBIN HOOD

This match in connection with the above League was played on the Victoria Park. The circumstances were not favourable for football, the severe frosts of the last day or two having a marked effect on the ground was exceedingly hard, and was covered with a thin coating of snow. Both clubs occupy positions towards the bottom of the league chart. The visitors had scored eight points of the seven of the YMCA, but had played in 13 matches, three more than the local team, who had won two, lost six, leaving three drawn. The Robin Hood had won three games, lost eight, two being drawn. Hugglescote won the toss, and elected to defend the Park-road goal. The ball having been put in motion for the YMCA, the visitors pressed during the opening stages, McAlpin and Miller both stopping dangerous rushes, but the Robin Hood went for them again, Picken fisting away a hot shot. Play then took a turn in favour of the YMCA, a free for hands giving them a distinct advantage. Miller mis-kicked when taking a shot at goal, and the ball was ultimately sent wide of the posts. Going on, the Hugglescote right wing went off finely, and took the game close to goal where Picken was unable to stop a shot by Poxon, and thus the visitors drew first blood. M Tyler was conspicuous with pretty play, but his run was cut short by G Marriott, and being driven back to their own territory, the Reds had to concede a corner, which proved fruitless. A clever run by M Tyler again transferred play, and Emms centred, but a goal kick was the only result. The visitors had three frees in their favour in rapid succession, and with them were able to bombard their opponents' goal, Rice eventually

heading through the second goal. The last-named put in a pretty run later, but Picken was just in time in turn the final shot outside the post. After this further reverse, the YMCA played up, and for a long time stormed Hugglescote's goal, which had several narrow escapes, H Tyler, in particular, putting in a dashing run before shooting. However, Walker was playing a safe game, and twice saved nicely. Hugglescote were not long before they had their opponents acing on the defensive, and for hands close in, the ball was kicked to Moore, who sent through, Picken being unable to get away. Picken a few minutes later saved from a remarkable hot shot, clearing a he expense of a corner. Still pressing, Hugglescote kept the YMCA for a long time penned in their own half, and Poxton kicked over the bar. Then the Reds broke away, H Tyler sprinting down his wing, but T B Brows, when shooting, kicked high over the bar, and Emms just after missed the desired spot by a yard or so. Walker had shots to save hereabouts, and each time proved equal to the occasion. The visitors did not allow the game to stop at this end of the ground for long, for by means of pretty combined play they were soon storming round the YMCA's goal. McAlpin was called on to save, but heading away he sent to Rice, who easily beat Picken. Soon after half-time was arrived, the game standing:

On resuming, the homesters were the first to press, Baley putting in a dashing run, passing to H Tyler, who sent on to T B Brows, for the latter to put on a goal for the Reds. A moment later the last-named had another shot at goal, the ball just missing its mark. T Brown went down his wing nicely, but was prettily tricked by ice and McAlpin had to clear. Both ends were then visited, H Tyler twice centring, each time to find the visitors' backs safe. At the other end Moore shot for goal, but Picken, running out, effected a clever save, McAlpin also clearing nicely. The visitors' right wing later, took the ball half the length of the field, and on it being centred to Rice, he shot straight at Picken, who again ran out and cleared. Another grand run by Rice, which was frustrated by an infringement, lames was within an ace of scoring, the ball grazing the post. Combined run by Rice and James put the YMCA goal again in danger, and the former kicked over the bar a moment later Picken saving a shot from the same player. For a long time, the home team could not get the ball out of their half. This was at last accomplished by means of a neat run by Bailey, but only the result was a coupe, of goal kicks, and Moore captured a pass a moment later when the Reds were getting dangerous, play going once more to the other end, where a fruitless corner was forced. The bills announcing the above match, which was played at Shepshed, were headed "Old Rivals", and probably there could be no truer definition. For many years these clubs have met in friendly rivalry to try conclusions on the football ground long before the professional element was introduced in the neighbourhood, and it might with truth be said that it was in those palmy days that Loughborough caught largely the Shepshed football enthusiasm. However, much has happened since then, and whilst Loughborough have progressed by "leaps and bounds" in the football world, Shepshed have for obvious reasons continued the even tenour of their way. The first match between the teams this season was played on Boxing Day, but the Shepshed club were not fully represented, and the match ended in a victory for the home team by four goals to love. The return match today was anticipated with keen interest. Several gentlemen in Shepshed who take considerable interest in the game, in the earlier part of the week decided to invite the rival teams after the match to dinner in the skittle alley of the Liberal Club at six o'clock, when Mr J Harriman JP was expected to preside.

The ball was started at three o'clock and the game at once became very fast. Despite all efforts, however, when half-time was called no goal had been scored. The game was even in the second half, though

unfortunately one short during the latter portion of the game. There was a good number of spectators present. Result:

Marriott made a good kick from mid-field, all but scoring. The Athletic made strenuous efforts to score, Walker and the home backs having a hard time of it. After play in neutral ground Plackett missed bis kick, and let in James and Moore, who worked the leather well up, Moore narrowly missing the uprights. In the second half, the Robins' pressed and forced a corner, which was beautifully placed, but not converted, although the visiting backs were severely taxed, Poxon shortly afterwards beating Neale. Hands against the Robins close in goal made matters look extremely dangerous for the homesters, the ball being got away only with difficulty. This was the first meeting of the two clubs in the above League, but their form was pretty well known as they had met in the Wellingborough Cup Competition on the Walnut-street ground Christmas-day, when the Rovers asserted their superiority by defeating Wellingborough by six to nothing. Under the circumstances the ultimate result of the match under notice was looked upon as a good thing for the Rovers, and that they would add another to their already lengthy list of wins, although were playing without Miller and Stirling, who were greatly missed. The visitors played up in a surprising manner, and the Rovers must consider themselves very lucky to get off with a draw, for it was absolutely the worst game they have played this season. The ground was in a wretched condition owing to the heavy rains during the day and with a choppy wind blowing accurate football was out of the question, but this did not account for the utter failure on the part of the Rovers. When the teams lined there was a fair attendance, and Lord having lost the toss, Milliken started he ball from the entrance goal, the visitors left wing immediately breaking away, but Edwards kicking too hard a goal-kick resulted. Hammersley then dashed away up the wing, during which he was applauded for some tricky play, by means of which he reached the visitor's line, Brigstock, however, sent him back, but Milliken returned, and caused Ekins some trouble, and before the latter could properly clear Priestman had a pop, the ball going wide. Play then ensued of an uninteresting character, the ball being strictly confined to mid-field. Hands having been given against Pickard the game opened out somewhat, Wellingborough leading up to hot attack and looked certain to score through a mistake by McFarlane.
