The 1894-95 season saw a rise in applications to the Midland League that eventually led to a 14 team division for the first time. The new clubs were Derby County Reserves (aka Derby Town), Heanor Town, Ilkeston Town, Matlock, Rushden Town and Stoke Swifts. Two clubs who had competed in the Midland League during the previous season, Mansfield Town and Mansfield Greenhalgh's amalgamated to form "Mansfield." Derby County Reserves (2nd), Heanor Town (1st), Ilkeston (3rd) and Matlock (5th) all competed in the Derbyshire League during the 1893-94 season. Stoke Swifts had finished runners-up in the [Combination](#), a league for clubs based in the North-West of England.

The prospects of the clubs most likely to succeed during the new season was difficult to gauge.

Derby County Reserves started well, as expected, losing only once in their opening ten fixtures. They fielded a high number of players from their First Division squad. Stoke Swifts, a club that was generally regarded as the Stoke Reserve team, also began in impressive style, and suffered only one defeat in the first twelve games. It is worth noting that the defeats experienced by both Derby and Stoke amidst their impressive starts to the season were against Loughborough.

Thus, before the season was too old, it became abundantly clear that Loughborough had put together a formidable team. By early December they were still undefeated and had only dopped two points in drawn games at home to Kettering and at Stoke Swifts. Defensively they were very sound, illustrated by the fact that after the 2-2 draw with Kettering no team scored more than once against them for 16 games, and only then in 5-3 and 5-2 victories. It was not until almost the last week of March that Loughborough suffered their first defeat in the Midland League. When it came, it provided the biggest upset of the season as last-

placed Grantham Rovers beat the runaway leaders by a single goal on the Harlaxton-road ground. Prior to this game Grantham had only won twice in 17 matches.

Stoke Swifts and Derby County Reserves maintained their pursuit of Loughborough, although both lost matches that they could have been expected to have won. Of the other new clubs, Ilkeston Town fared the best of the rest, finishing their first Midland league campaign in sixth place. Mansfield, Heanor and Rushden filled the positions immediately below them. Matlock, meanwhile, struggled and ended the season at the foot of the table, winning just 3 of their 26 League fixtures.

Following two seasons in the doldrums, Gainsborough Trinity had something of a resurgence ending the campaign in fourth place. Trinity forward Joe Raby was the League's joint leading goal scorer with Jack Thorpe of Kettering with 15 goals.

Loughborough won the Midland League well before the end of the season. They lost their last two games against Doncaster Rovers and Derby County Reserves, which served only to reduce the margin of supremacy. The Derby defeat prevented Gainsborough from taking third place and here was some concern when it was discovered that the Derby club had fielded almost their first team.

Loughborough scored 84 goals, which included 8 against Newark and 7 against Matlock, Rushden, and Ilkeston and 6 in consecutive games against Rushden away and Doncaster Rovers at home. Robert Edge, one of the infamous "Wolverhampton four" was Luff's top scorer with a near goal-a-game record, before returning to Molineux before the season ended. Gaining 18 votes, Loughborough Town were duly elected to the Football League, where they replaced Walsall Town Swifts. Leicestershire 'derby days' from now on would be in the Football League. Loughborough were formally crowned Midland League Champions at the twenty-eighth annual sports held on 2 June 1895 on the Athletic Grounds, before a large gathering. There was a huge cheer as club President Mr J E Johnson-Ferguson MP for the Loughborough division unfurled the flag after it was ceremonially presented to him by Mr A Kingscott, of Derby, secretary of the Midland League. Success, however, came at a cost as the Fosse had also discovered. Unfortunately, the deficit was huge, that would eventually strangle the club to a premature death. Loughborough made a loss of £258 4s 4d in 1893-4, against £110 the previous season. Unfortunate injuries to Kent and Coulton, and several other players, resulted in an additional expenditure of nearly £100. Players wages and travelling expenses had increased by £294 to £938 1s 16s, mainly as a direct result of having to sign fresh players to take the place of those injured, and a large proportion of the players not residing in Loughborough.
