
English Challenge (FA) Cup 1896-97





Leicestershire were represented by Coalville Town, Hinckley Town, Leicester Fosse and Loughborough. Hinckley Town were knocked out in the first qualifying round by Bulwell. Coalville, who were given a bye into the next round, were slaughtered 6-1 at home by Swadlincote in the second qualifying round.

Loughborough entered the competition in the third qualifying round. They were drawn away against Mansfield, who had resigned from the Midland League at the end of the 1895-96 due to financial reasons, and caused a cup shock by beating the Second Division side.

Leicester Fosse were yet again eliminated by Kettering in the final qualifying round, after beating Bulwell and Wellingborough.


The 1897 FA Cup final was contested by Aston Villa and Everton at Crystal Palace. Aston Villa won 3–2, with goals by John Campbell, Fred Wheldon and Jimmy Crabtree. Everton's goals came from Jack Bell and Dickie Boyle. With results elsewhere going their way, Villa confirmed their status as League champions on this day. This makes them the only team to date to achieve the league and cup "double" on the same day.



KETTERING V. LEICESTER FOSSE.

seven thousand, including 900 from Leicester. The match was well contested, and play was fast and ex-
citing from beginning to end. Kettering had slightly the best of the exchanges, and managed to win by
two goals to one, the same as last season when the teams met in this competition at Leicester. Ketter-
ing were well represented. Heskin, who had had his
leg broken some time ago in the field, has now re- joined his team, playing centre-half, and Ball, who was formerly centre-half, is a greater succes as centre

forward than others who had held that position this season. Both McMillan and Trainer were absent from the Leicoster team, with the result that

right. The first half was the most even, each goal being attacked in quick succession. Kettering led
off with the scoring through Eall three minutes from the start, but before five minutes more had elapsed
Worrall had equalized. Pell put into the net before half-time, whan Kettering were leading by two to one.
Kettering did most of the pressing at the commence- ment of the second half, but could not get through
again. Leicester attacked strongly towards the close,
but they failed to make a draw. The defence on each side was very creditable, and the custodians, though
seldom called upon, effected some remarkable saves. Kettering were somewhat superior in the forward
rank, but towards the close their forces were disorgan- ised through Miller and Ball being hurt, the former
