The Leicestershire Football League was Leicestershire's first Association Football league competition.

A meeting of gentlemen interested in football was held at the Victoria Hotel, Leicester, in March 1890, when representatives were present from the following clubs:— Leicester Fosse, Melton Rovers, South Wigston, Loughborough, Leicester Teachers, Hugglescote Robin Hood, South Wigston, Leicester Victor, Shepshed, and the Leicestershire Football Association, the question; being the desirability of forming a Football League for the county. Mr. J. Cooper, Loughborough, occupied the chair —Mr. Ashmole proposed that League for Leicestershire be formed, which was seconded and carried unanimously. It was suggested that 10 clubs should form the League an amendment in favour of 12 being proposed. On a vote the smaller number was agreed to by 10 votes to 3. Thirteen clubs were nominated, and the following 10 selected: Loughborough, Melton Rovers, Shepshed, Coalville. Leicester Teachers, Hugglescote Robin Hood, South Wigston, Market Harborough, and Leicester Fosse. A fortnight was allowed for the clubs to signify their intention to join the League, and in case any should decline, it was agreed that the following clubs should be admitted in the order named: Leicester Victor, Syston, Hinckley. The subscription was fixed at £1 1s. Mr. J. T. Hincks, of Leicester, was appointed president, and it was agreed that there should be 12 vice-presidents, one appointed by each club, the executive of the remaining two nominated by the committee. Mr. Ashmole was elected secretary, and another resolution passed was that the committee should formed of one representative from each club, the executive to consist of five, to chosen by the general committee.

Leicester Fosse withdrew from the competition after Frank Gardner stated that club would not be able to play their full-strength side in all Leicestershire League matches, as their first team would be playing in other matches on the same days. Leicestershire's other top club, Loughborough pulled out after successfully applying to join the Midland Alliance League.

By the time the fixture list (see Appendix below) was published in September 1890, the inaugural Leicestershire Football League competition comprised just 8 teams - Coalville Town, Gresley Rovers, Hugglescote Robin Hood, Leicester Teachers, Melton Rovers, Shepshed Town, South Wigston and Syston Wreake Valley.

Gresley Rovers, which are still in existence, are based in Derbyshire.

Leicester was represented in the Leicestershire Football League by just one club - Leicester Teachers.

It is worth noting the distance between the clubs. Travelling more than a few miles was time consuming during the 1890s. In reality the mode of transport was limited to bicycle, horse, brake (carriage), and train. Given that most employed players and spectators worked on Saturday morning, it is perhaps not surprising that many games started late and often finished early due to the lack of daylight from November to the end of February. Furthermore, the fields of play were often flooded, and the weather also adversely impacted on both the quality of football played and the completion of fixtures.

The first game of the Leicestershire Football League took place on Saturday 13 September 1890 when Hugglescote Robin Hood beat Coalville Town 3-0.

The next round of games was not played for another three weeks, when Syston Wreake Valley conceded 11 goals away at Hugglescote. In the two other games played that day, Leicester Teachers beat Coalville (3-1) and Gresley Rovers scored six against South Wigston. The following week Syston Wreake Valley conceded 7 against Leiceser Teachers, making it 18 in just two games. South Wigston also lost their second game, although in their third game they managed to draw against Melton Rovers.

Shepshed's season started badly, as firstly one of the stars of the Senior Cup winning team, Elijah Needham signed professional forms for the Lancashire club Bootle, and secondly, the first Leicestershire Football League fixture, away to Gresley Rovers, was lost by six goals to one. The following week though, 1 November 1890, Shepshed slaughtered Syston Wreake Valley 10-0. As with the very first Leicestershire Senior Cup fixture at Shepshed three years earlier, Shepshed welcomed the new competition with a home win.

Gresley won their first 8 League games and only suffered one defeat – away at Shepshed in March 1891.

Richardson of Melton Town appeared to have been unaware that his side's home game against Gresley in January 1891 was to be played at Melton Swift's enclosure, and as a result "frivolled away his time in another field."

At a meeting of the Leicester Football Association on 10 January 1891, a letter was read from Syston Wreake Valley FC stating that they wished to withdraw from the League, since their secretary could not raise teams. Their representative on the Management Committee of League resigned.

Melton Rovers were fined 5s for not turning up at Shepshed on 27 December. Coalville were fined 16s for a similar offence against Gresley, who made a claim of £4 against them.

Leicester Daily Mercury sports columnist "Forward" reported in December 1890 that ... *"it is not a little remarkable that in nearly every match in which the Rovers [Gresley] have figured this season one or more of their*

opponents have been laid low - whether on account of the Rovers roughness or their own awkwardness I don't pretend to know."

Syston Wreake Valley conceded 30 goals in their first four League games. Their only points came from a victory against Melton Rovers.

In December Shepshed did not play a League game as both Coalville on 13 December and Melton Rovers on 27 December failed to arrive.

Sadly in March 1891 with both Syston Wreake Valley and Leicester Teachers having resigned and with the suspension of Coalville Town for non-payment of a fine, the Leicestershire Football League, collapsed, leaving the League table, according to local newspapers looking:

Although Gresley are still Champions, runners-Up are Shepshed not Hugglescote. However, there are errors in this archive. The 3-3 draw with Coalville in November 1891 and the 3-2 victory to Gresley against the same club a month later are not Leicestershire Football League fixtures, they were in fact Leicestershire Senior Cup games.

Although not all of the fixtures were not completed, it was possible to declare Gresley Rovers as league winners. Scores and match reports for all Leicestershire Football League games played **may not** have been found. If anyone has any additional information, please get in touch.

In 1894 the Leicester and Northants League was founded. Leicester Fosse Reserves were crowned champions in the first two seasons. In 1896, the league changed name to the Leicestershire Senior League, Leicester Fosse Reserves, winning the inaugural competition. Apart from a two-year hiatus between 1901 and 1903, the League has run continuously since 1903 apart from during the two world wars and a four-year spell in the 1930s. A second division was added in 1948.

#1 FOOTBALL – The Town [Coalville] Football Club opened their season on Saturday, when they met the Hugglescote Robin Hood on the “Waggon and Horses” ground. The match was in connection with the Leicestershire League and excited a great deal of interest. The home team held the upper hand all through and won by three goals to none.

#1 COALVILLE TOWN v. HUGGLESCOTE ROBIN HOOD– The opening of the Leicestershire League matches was commenced on the Waggon and Horses ground, Coalville, on Saturday last, between Coalville Town v Hugglescote Robin Hood, and resulted in a win for the home team by three goals to nil. Coalville: W Compton, goal; J Nichols and C Eales, backs; R Smith, W Lakin, and R Nichols, half-backs; W Glover and Brownlow, right wing; W Smith and T Garratt, left wing; Maddocks, centre. Hugglescote: W Walker, goal; W Deacon and G Marriott, backs; D Moore, J Poole and J Kendrick, half-backs; H Cross and W Underwood, right wing; S Gent and S Pool, left wing; J Marriott, centre. #2 LEICESTERSHIRE LEAGUE

ROBIN HOOD v. SYSTON WREAKE VALLEY - This Leicestershire League match was played at Hugglescote. The ball was kicked off at four o'clock, and a lively game ensued for the first ten minutes. The home team then began to show their supremacy. Moore being the first to pass the ball through the goal. The ball was soon again up at the System end, and many good shots made were repulsed by Hewitt, who kept goal in grand style throughout. A sharp shot from J. Marriott, however, secured goal number two; Moore immediately after scored number three, and a little fine passing by Pool and Moore put the ball in Strait's way, who scored number four. Pool was the next to score from a tame kick, which the goal-keeper evidently took for an "outer." The same player added the sixth goal which shot through after hitting the post. Pool afterwards ran up the ground, but was stopped by Hewitt, who returned it to Strait, who took the ball through, the game at half-time standing seven goals to nil. On the resumption of play Syston at once made a run at the Robin Hood goal. The ball was returned by the backs, and after a little dodging by Gent that player made a grand long shot, which secured number eight. Kendrick scored the next goal by a long shot from the centre of the ground, which the goalkeeper failed to hold, although handled by him. It was now time for Syston to score. and a rush was made for the Robin Hood' and a good shot was stopped by Walker, but before he had time to get back the ball was shot through. The game was now more equal for a little time, give and-take play being the order of the day. This did not satisfy Pool, who after some short play scored number 10. Syston after some good passing goal secured their second goal by a good shot from Potter. Repeated shots were made at the Syston goal, and Pool scored 11, four of which had been kicked by that player. The result at the finish was Robin Hood, 11 goals; Wreake Valley, 2 goals. Hewitt kept goal first-class or many more goals would

have been made. He was very busy throughout the match. Players -Robin Hods: Messrs. D. S. Moore, J. Marriott, G. Marriott, S. Gent, J. Pool, I. Mattley, J. Brearley, A. Strait, W. Lakin, H. #3 LEICESTER TEACHERS v. COALVILE TOWN - This Leicestershire League match was played on the private ground of the Teachers, who won, after a moderate game, by three goals to one, Eyles (2) and Bailey being the scorers for the winners.

Leicester Daily Post - 6 October 1890

#4 GRESLEY ROVERS v. SOUTH WIGSTON - Played on the ground of the former. South Wigston winning the toss, the Rovers started the ball, and at once began to press, but owing to excellent goal-keeping were for some time unable to score. The visitors then played up and equalised matters, but this to put the Rovers on their mettle, and the forwards, getting possession with a piece of splendid combination, scored goal No. 2. After this they held the upper hand till the call of half-time, the score then being four goals to one in the Rovers favour. The ball being restarted, the Rovers dashed off in good style, but excellent shots from the forwards were repelled by the clever play of Crook in goal. The Rovers, not to be daunted, scored No. 5. The visitors, rousing themselves by a piece of good play from the right wing, scored No. 2. After this the Rovers sent shot after shot, but the goal-keeper keeping at his work stopped them in splendid style, amidst loud applause from the spectators, the Rovers scoring No. 6 about five minutes before the call of time, thus winning easily by six goals to two. Leicester Daily Post - 6 October 1890

#5 HUGGLESCOTE ROBIN HOOD v. SOUTH WIGSTON - This match was played at Wigston. The home team at once pressed, but Walker saved splendidly. Even play followed, and then Poole scored for Hugglescote. On crossing over Wigston at once assumed the aggressive, and from a corner Medley headed through and made matters even. Fast play followed, and although Wigston had slightly the best of matters, Hugglescote scored again, and won by two goals to nil.

Leicester Daily Post - 13 October 1890

#6 LEICESTER TEACHERS v SYSTON WREAKE VALLEY - Played at System. The Teachers were minus Exton, Faire and Liniker, whose places were filled by Key, Halliday, and Preston. The Valley played about their full strength. Winning the toss Syston kicked off, but gained nothing by this advantage, for the ball was quickly taken from their forwards, and a free kick for "hands" conceded to the town team in the Syston territory, and then, after some retaliative play, another resulted in the mouth of the home goal, but nothing came of it. Syston then rushed the ball down the field, but the shot for goal went wide of the mark. The ball was then, from the kick out, smartly returned up the field, but Wilkes in attempting to head a nice centre from Halliday, failed to score, and System, taking advantage, ran the ball back to the Teachers' goal quarters, a capital shot resulting, but Preston in goal stopped it beautifully. Play now settled down round the Syston goal, but Wilkes having another good chance, kicked wildly, and Rowntree, who then had the ball, also made a bad shot at goal. Syston right wing (Walton and Lewin) now took the ball into the enemy's quarters, but missed a good chance of scoring, the ball being passed rashly to the left wing (Potter and Sharpe), who, had they not been stopped finely by Bailey, would undoubtedly have run in. Give-and-take play here reigned, and then Rowntree, having the ball nicely passed to him by Eyles, again made a crooked shot, missing an easy chance; and again, in having the ball passed to him, missed his third chance. Martin now gave a free kick to Syston, who lost ground by it, and Bailey, getting the ball, had hard lines in not scoring from a long shot. Ratcliffe now returned it, the home forwards in pretty style, and Martin, in defending, made a poor attempt, letting Syston in, but Preston took the ball well, and threw it nicely up the field, when it was returned quickly to the home goal, and Hanford kicked a goal, which on an appeal was ruled offside by the referee. The Teachers through slow play here failed to convert a prettily placed corner kick by Bingham, and the ball was taken towards their own goal; but Bailey, taking it from the Syston left wing, evaded both half-backs and backs, and shot a nice

goal. Handford gave a free kick to the home team; but Eyles, having the ball sharply centred to him, after a muff by the Syston goalkeeper, put it through. Even play continued for some time, but Martin conceding a penalty kick gave Syston an advantage, and the same player had to kick out to save Syston taking their first corner kick; but nothing came of it, Eyles again getting the ball, and rushing it up the ground, scored a second time, Syston goalkeeper showing poor form between the uprights. Syston kicked off, but the ball soon travelled among the visiting forwards, Wilke, Hanford, and Eyles passing prettily, and their combined rush in nearly resulted in another goal. Half-time here intervened. On resuming, Syston, who opposed the kick-off, were outwitted by the Teachers' forwards, who, however, through bad shooting on the part of Rowntree, were denied the honour of another goal. The advantage was now with the Rovers, and then with Hugglescote, and forty-four minutes had gone before the Rovers obtained the first goal. In fairness to the visitors, it should nevertheless be observed that they played the best and the strongest game. It was Brewin's manipulation of the leather that led to the above result, although R. Smith put it between the posts. Half-time was called five minutes afterwards, four minutes being added for time lost in getting the ball from the other side of the hedge, whither it was sent about six times. Two others were given to the same side in quick succession, but no advantage was gained.
