From statements made by the treasurer and secretary, it appears that there is a fair balance in hand, and that during the past season the club have played seventeen matches, won ten, lost five, and drawn two. On the withdrawal of the cloth, the president Mr. James Jones, of the Lymes, Ravenstone Fields (partner in the elastic works, Belvoir-road, Coalville), took the chair, Mr. Jas. Scasebrook being in the vice. The toasts of the "Queen and the Royal Family" were very loyally given by the Chairman, but of Prince Leopold they were drunk in silence; "The Army, Navy, and Auxilliary Forces" was next given, to which the vice-chairman very appropriately responded. Mr. J. Moulden gave an excellent song, "I have no home," and the Secretary then read the report of the season's doings, the Chairman making some excellent observations on the game of football as an exercise, and now, by its rules and practice, grown into an art. The health of the secretary, Mr. John Burton, was proposed by the Chairman, and met with a very hearty response; Mr. W. Bradshaw sang "St. Patrick's Day Parade." The secretary read a statement of accounts, and stated that the club would have (when all the subscriptions had been paid) the substantial balance of £3 14s 7d. The reports were adopted, and the meeting proceeded to elect officers for the ensuing season, 1884.5, with the following result:—President and vice-president, T. Wright, Esq., and Mr. A. T. LEICESTER VICTORIA FOOTBALL CLUB. — The annual meeting of the members of this club was held on Friday evening last at the "Welford" Coffee House, when a report of the past season's doings was read, showing that 29 matches had been played: of these 10 were won, 13 lost, and six drawn, which, considering some of the teams played, was very satisfactory, and showed a great improvement over former seasons. FOOTBALL CLUB.—The annual general meeting of the Forest United Football Club was held on Monday in the Railway Hotel club-room. Mr. J. Needham was voted to the chair, and the secretary, Mr. J. H. Grimley, presented his report, which stated: "The season that has just closed has been one of the most successful we have had with regard to the matches played, the club not having lost a single game. We have played 11 matches, won nine, drawn two, scoring 38 goals to our opponents' three. This I believe has not been equalled before in Sheepshed. And now that the Band of Hope Club has joined with us we hope to do even better in the future. The reason we have only played 11 matches is because three clubs failed to play us at all, and one return we did not play."—Mr. J. Needham said the Band of Hope Club had had a very successful season, considering the clubs they had played, viz., Loughborough Victoria, which they won at Sheepshed by three goals to none, while at Loughborough the Victorians won by three goals to one. They had also played Loughborough Star, Mountsorrel Star, Long Whatton, Ibstock Albion, and others, and considering that 16 matches had been played, of which only three were lost, he thought it very creditable.
