#9 ANSTEY ALBION v IMPERIAL LEICESTER

These teams met at Anstey, before a fair company. Mr. Albert Chamberlain officiated as referee. The spin for the coin favoured the Imperial, who decided to kick down the slope, with a stiff breeze at their backs. From the start the visitors went off in fine style for the Albion goal, but Jackson and Springthorpe put a stop to the rush. At length in spite of the very strong breeze the Albion forwards managed to get in the vicinity of the Imperial goal, and after a tough struggle Wright put the ball in the net, to the delight of the home supporters. About this time a heavy downpour of rain came on, and football was continued under conditions the reverse of pleasant. However, the teams stuck to their work well, and in spite of the rain and sleet in their faces the Albion forwards got in possession, and after some pretty work by Bxxxx, Wright put in another goal to the Albion's credit. By this time player's presented a pitiable appearance, being drenched to the skin. Ultimately, Pollard, the Anstey left-winger, made a capital run, and completed a fine piece of work by scoring the third goal for his side. Soon after this the Imperial was taken, the state of the game being: Anstey Albion, three goals; Imperial, none. On commencing again, the Leicester team were several players short, and others did not appear to relish playing with a cold wind in their faces, and when they had only continued about five minutes they left the field. What the decision of the Rolleston Cup management will be we cannot say, but certainly Anstey should be awarded the match. Many think the teams will have to meet again and play the second half. If this should be so, Anstey have nothing to fear.

#10 GROBY ALBION v MELTON TOWN

Played on the Groby Ground, before a good company, miserable weather prevailing. Groby played their best team, and Melton were strongly represented. Mr. Linthwaite, the appointed referee, was prevented by illness officiating, and Mr. Jordan filled the vacancy. Melton left wing started with a rush, but were kept well in hand by the home backs. "Hands" against Jarvis put the Town in a good position, but no benefit was derived. A fine defence was displayed by the Melton backs, Chamberlain being most prominent. Melton took up the running, and had the best of the game for the next ten minutes, but Brooks was all that could be desired in goal. Marshall, for Groby and Warner, for the visitors were cheered for fine football. Midfield lay was now the order, until Groby, by good combination, got near their opponents' citadel, when Bennett headed the ball to T. Marvin, who sent in a shot which was too much for Bexon, the home team drawing first blood. W Wood gave a foul, and Melton found a corner, Broks fisting out splendidly, but only to be tried with another shot, which he returned also. A very heavy storm burst over the ground, and the field was very treacherous in consequence. Before half-time Melton were playing nine men, Chamberlain having to retire through an accident, and Books retiring owing to the inclement weather on account of a recent illness. Half-time score, Groby, one; Melton, none. Crossing over, Melton took up the aggressive and the Groby custodian was severely taxed. Not to be denied. Melton forwards stuck to their work, and at last Smith

equalized. Melton, man for man, were undoubtedly the best team, but the loss of their two players was keenly felt, and affected the result. A sharp fight continued, and about a minute before time Jordan, the home centre forward, bagged the ball. Groby are to be complimented on their fine form against a strong team like Melton, but undoubtedly, the better combination were defeated. Result: Groby, two goals; Melton, one.

#28 ORSON WRIGHT AND SONS v WHITWICK WHITE CROSS

This match was played at South Wigston last Saturday. The ground was terribly hard, and round the goals looked like a sheet of glass, but the referee decided to play the game, after calling the teams together and cautioning them against roughness. The White Cross won the toss, and played with the wind behind them, but though this aided they continually pressed and had most of the game, they were unable to score, and half-time was reached without any score. On resuming Orson Wright's became very dangerous for some twenty minutes, but were kept out, and then the better condition of the Whitwick team rapidly told its tale. First a penalty was given and taken by Allen, but this was grandly saved. Allen, however, shortly after put in a splendid goal from a fine centre by Middleton. Just before time the issue was put beyond doubt by the same player again scoring. For the home team Wright at back and the two Coulsons and Castle were most noticeable, while for the visitors Allen, Kane, Middleton, and Hall played a sterling game. The referee was Mr. A Marson; linesmen, Messrs. Carpenter, and Jinks.

#29 ROLLESTON CHARITY CUP FINAL

BURBAGE UNITED v. WHITWICK WHITE CROSS

The final for possession of this trophy was played on t-o premier Rugby Club's enclosure, before a fairly good crowd, which included contingents from Burbage and Whitwick. Fine weather prevailed, and the condition, were excellent for a fast game. Both teams were representative, and presented a smart appearance on turning out, being recorded a hearty reception. Marshall kicked off for Burbage, and after a few midfield exchanges, Worthington got down the wing for Burbage, showing a nice turn of speed, but the khaki-coloured backs drove them back ere they could become dangerous, and the ball was quickly at the other end, where Taylor was tested with a good shot from Allen, and it was only with difficulty cleared. A minute later Wood put high over the net. Worthington again distinguished himself by getting well down the wing and putting in a capital centre across the goal mouth, but the most was not made of it, and Allen got away for Whitwick, and gave a judicious pass to the left, which, however, got placed behind. Through a miskick, Sheffield got off clear, and into a good position, but his shot for goal was well met by Williams, who saved at the expense of a corner, the flag-kick being placed behind. The Burbage forwards then took up the running again and play was principally in their opponents' half for a short time, but Percival was only called on to take a goal-kick or two. However, the Burbage right-wingers forced a corner, and Worthington put a grand curling kick on top of the net. The Khaki Boys had another turn, and gave the Burbage backs some anxious moments. Burbage just managed to save their bacon in a desperate melee in their goal mouth and Taylor saved a fairly fast ground shot in good fashion. Whitwick still continued to press severely, but the shooting hereabouts was a bit erratic, and the game slowed down considerably for a short period. Then Lucas enlivened matters by dashing down the left wing for Burbage. Springthorpe robbed him, and directly after Lucas got penalised for fouling. The free availed the White Cross little, as Burbage were quickly dangerous at the other end, and Percival was called on two or three times in quick succession. No point accrued from a bit of spirited play, and the Whitwick forwards got to the other end, where a smart shot from the left struck the bar at the top of the net. Worthington again dashed down the wing but got fouled and the penalty was eventually placed behind. A bit of short passing on Burbage's left wing ended in Smith sending a long swinging pass across to the other wing, and Wood put in a fast ground shot which only massed the mark by inches. Play followed in interesting fashion up to half-time, but at that point there was

NO SCORE

After changing ends, play recommenced a trifle tamely compared with that which had passed. After a brief visit to the Burbage end, play settled somewhat in the White Cross half, where the ball was despatched by the backs on several voyages of discovery over the large stand. After Taylor had had a couple of shots to save, Knight had a "pop" from half-back, and landed on the net. The Burbage forwards again got down, and a nice field movement looked extremely dangerous for Whitwick, but Springthorpe was handy with a clever saving kick at the expense of a corner. Play then went on fast and furious, and as the result of a bit of combined play. Clamp shot the first goal for Whitwick. This reverse seemed to upset Burbage somewhat: anyway, for a few minutes they could do nothing right, and Whitwick came within an ace of roaring a second goal. At length Burbage got into their stride again, and the centre put a fairly straight shot in at the Whitwick goalkeeper.

Following this, Burbage forced a corner, which " Sixer" beautifully placed, but Whitwick escaped, and a moment later Percival was forced to make two attempts to save a dropping shot. While some of the crowd shouted for a goal, adjudging that he had stepped under the bar, the referee ruled otherwise. Whitwick again applied pressure and were now playing much the smartest football. After two or three fouls and a bit of good play in front of the Burbage goal, J. Hall put in a good long shot, which gave the khaki's a second goal. Whitwick still kept up the pressure, and the right wing worked their way down the field, and forced the ball into the net, but two or three men were down for some infringement or other, and the White Cross were awarded a penalty, which Middleton put over. Play went to the other end, where Burbage tried hard to score, and at length their efforts were rewarded, for Worthington met a clearance from Percival, and hooked the ball into the net. Play went on in exciting fashion after this point, but nothing further was scored, and a pleasant game ended:

Additional Information

CROFT

Accident last football Stanton in the second round for Rolleston Charity Cup and Croft Alf Duncan young man of this village and the left full back of Croft team, met with fall and broke his arm above the wrist, about five minutes after the start. He was attended by Dr Cogswell and afterwards taken to the Leicester-Infirmiry where the fracture was set. The young man returned home same day and is now progressing favourably. The result of the match was Stanton four goals Croft two; the Croft team having to play one short consequence of accident.
