It took no less than four attempts to settle the Round 1 tie between Hugglescote and Whitwick Rovers in Round 1. The first game was played in such dreadful weather that it was decided to classify it as a friendly rather than a cup game. Then followed three score draws, with the tie eventually being decided in favour of Whitwick, because of Hugglescote fielding an ineligible player.

The holders, Castle Donnington, were eliminated in Round 2 by Barrow Rising Star at the third attempt.

Hugglescote and Kegworth Town were both eliminated for fielding ineligible players.

Coalville Town Swifts won the Cup after beating Kegworth St Andrew's by the narrowest of margins at Barrow.

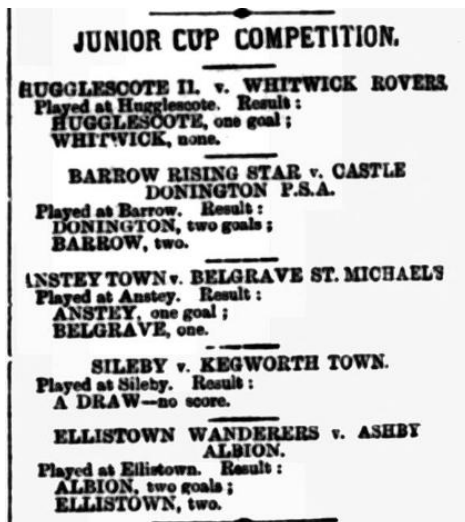

**#37 THE FOOTBALL MATCH** – Excitement ran high in Barwell last Saturday, as to the probable result of the semi-final of the Leicestershire Junior Cup Match. The competing teams were the Barwell Swifts and the Coalville Town Swifts, and the match was played at Enderby. The home team took with them a large number of supporters, but there was also left at home some equally enthusiastic admirers whose whole attention seemed to be concentrated in ascertaining as early as possible the result of the game. Any attempt to obtain information as to the winners of the boat race seemed altogether out of place, such a national event being of no moment compared with the match at Enderby. When a “wire” arrived the effect that the village men had won by 3 goals to one many anxious faces wore a less troubled expression, while their owners must have had a very different feeling to those of the Coalvillites, who seemed certain at victory – that is if the newspaper of their town correctly stated their convictions when it said, “they should easily be equal to giving the boot men their quietus.” The triumph of the Barwell men, however, was shortened, for on Monday, a protest was lodged by their opponents on the plea that the ground at Enderby was not roped round. This objection was dealt with at Leicester the same night, and although one of the Barwell players was allowed to give evidence, the club’s representative, Mr W Powers, was not allowed to have a voice in the matter at all, but was informed that the match would have to be replayed at Hinckley on the following Saturday. This is rather hard lines, but there is not much to fear of a reverse taking place in the score, and it will afford the Coalvillites another chance of giving the boot men in their quietus.

## Additional Information

**KEGWORTH.**

The chief topic of conversation during the past week, not only amongst the Town Club and its supporters, but also amongst all the football public in the village, has been the protest and its decision lodged by Sibley against the above club a fortnight ago in the first round of the Leicestershire Junior Cup, against W. C. Hopewell for having already played this season in a cup match with Notts. Jardines in the first round of the Notts. Junior Cup.

I am not going to discuss the pros and cons of the affair as to whether he played or not, as I am quite satisfied that the matter which was referred to the Emergency Committee of the L.F.A. has been thoroughly sifted, and no stone has been left unturned to arrive at the truth of the allegations. No doubt exists in the minds of the most sanguine now but what he played, and in the end the above committee have, I am pleased to say, not visited the sins of the player on his club or committee, they thinking no doubt that they had been led into the error unknowingly, but have ordered the match, which on the occasion of the first meeting ended in a draw, to be replayed on the Town ground this afternoon, and there is no doubt, unless the pigeons with their news have wandered, the result is now in another column.

Whether Hopewell himself will be punished will, I understand, be settled to-night (Thursday), at a special general meeting of the association, when other important business besides this is the draws for the third rounds of the competitions, and to consider the resignation of its highly esteemed hon. secretary, Mr. T. S. Ashmole, who is leaving Leicester very shortly to take a prominent and lucrative berth under the firm of Bass and Co. across the border.

"Lost, at Barwell, on Saturday, February 16, the Leicestershire Junior Cup and eleven silver medals. Anyone finding the same and returning them to the headquarters of the St. John's Club will be well rewarded for their trouble, and will earn the everlasting esteem of the players who made that ill-fated journey." "There's many a slip 'twixt cup and lip" is exemplified to the fullest extent by the result of the match at Barwell. A month ago it would not have been safe in certain quarters to hint at such a thing as defeat. St. John's were strong favourites for the junior trophy, and I must admit that I had a strong leaning in that direction myself, but the melancholy fact remains that these prognostications were incorrect. Should the St. Andrew's prove fortunate in the draw next Wednesday night there is no doubt of them figuring in the final of the same competition for the first time. If they do get in the final they will deserve every recognition possible, for they have played splendidly all through the competition, and have not, like St. John's, had any byes. In the four rounds they have scored 13 goals to three by their opponents, although the last two rounds have been played on grounds covered with several inches of snow. It seems strange that these should be the two matches in which the "reds" have proved the most successful, but such is the fact.

#### LEICESTERSHIRE FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION.

A meeting of the Emergency Committee was held on Wednesday at the Victoria Coffee House. Mr. A. Lovell presided, and there were also present Messrs. J. A. Utting (Kegworth), J. T. Hawkins (Hinckley), and J. E. Carpenter (hon. secretary). A protest was received from the Barwell Swifts against Coalville Town on the ground that Coalville played three ineligible men in the semi-final for the Junior Cup at Hinckley on Saturday last. Mr. Powers attended on behalf of Barwell, and Mr. Earp, representing the Coalville Club, asserted that the men in question did not play. The committee, having heard the statements of both sides, concluded that the protest was not maintained, and ordered the match to stand good—the final to be played at Barwell on Saturday as originally arranged. Mr. J. T. Hawkins was appointed linesman in the place of Mr. G. Beal, who will be unable to be present. It was decided to hold the last general meeting of the season on Thursday, April 25.
