Teams divided into Divisions for at least the first three rounds.

The final between Oakham Rovers and Leicester Ferndale at Oakham ended in a goal-less draw. The decision of the Leicestershire Football Association Executive in the selection to stage the final of Shield competition at Rutland seems "a most extraordinary one and totally unfair to one of the contesting clubs" [Oakham Rovers]. As the press reported, "there is not much neutrality about this, the Rovers actually playing on their own ground." Melton staged the replay. Despite a gale force wind there was a good attendance. Ferndale led 2-0 at the interval. Oakham clawed a goal back. Two players were sent off and the game finished 10 minutes early, with the agreement of both teams due to a storm which had increased in severity,

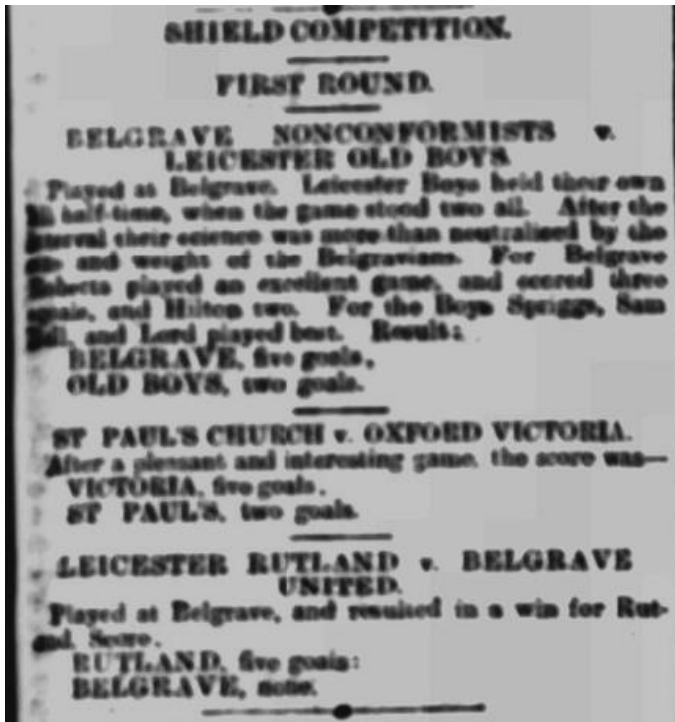

LEICESTERSHIRE SHIELD COMPETITION SECOND ROUND.

#15 MARKFIELD v. WHITWICK WHITE CROSS.

These clubs met in the second round of the Shield Competition at Markfield on Saturday. The home side won the toss and elected to play downhill. The kick-off was at 3-20. The game began very fast the White Cross at once began to press. In a few minutes they forced a corner, which, however, proved abortive, but soon after some good passing on the right wing by McCarthy and Dunleavy first blood was drawn by the White Cross. Starting again, three corners in succession were forced, Markfield managed to keep the ball out but soon after by a long shot Middleton scored again for the visitors. Markfield now began in their turn to press and gave considerable trouble for a while, securing two corners. Once more the ball was brought to the centre of the field by sturdy play on the part of Springthorpe at back and Waterfield at half-back. There was on further score when the whistle blew at half time. On resuming. Markfield played with more dash and would have scored twice but for the cool play of the Whitwick goalkeeper. Then becoming disorganised the White Cross soon brought the ball to the other end and Parker scored the third goal to which, after a clear run, Dunleavy soon added a fourth. The play now began to be rather rough, Springthorpe who had been playing with great pluck, being lamed. However, the White Cross still continued to play as though the game was yet undecided and by a long shot scored once more. In a scrimmage before goal, J. Notts put the ball into the for the home side shortly before the whistle blew, leaving the White Cross winners by 5 goals to 1.

#34 LOUGHBOROUGH CORINTHIANS v MOUNTSORREL CASTLE RESERVES

The match was played on the Corinthians ground, Forest-road ground, on Saturday. The home captain lost the toss, and was set to defend the Redmoor goal. From the kick off the Corinthians forwards worked the ball into the visitors' half, but were driven back. Midfield play followed, but after about 15 minutes, Palmer receiving a pass from Harrison, ran through, and scored the first goal for the Corinthians. From this point up to half-time the home side continued to press, but failed to increase their score. Upon resuming, the Corinthians pressed continuously, and it had not been for the grand defence of the Mountsorrel club a large score would have been run up against them. Result: One to none. Every member of the Corinthians team played a good game, and on present form they should stand an excellent chance of winning the Shield.

Played on the former's ground. Both sides were strongly represented. The game was fast, exciting, and even, the teams appearing well balanced. At the interval neither side had scored. Matters were pretty much the same for some time after crossing over, but the Corinthians eventually pressed, and it was only determined defence of the Ferndale that prevented several; goals from being scored. The Corinthians had the hardest luck imaginable, the crossbar being struck thrice in the last few minutes, and time came with a clear sheet.

These teams met at Melton for the second time on Saturday to contest the right to hold this trophy. Despite the wretched weather there was a very good attendance. Leicester Ferndale had the advantage of a strong gale in the first half and put on two goals. Crossing over the Oakham team, assisted by an increasing gale, kept the Leicester team very much on the defence, and after a very effective round of passing scored. The result put a great deal of spirit into the match, and two of the players were ordered off the field. After this Oakham pressed continuously. The storm, however, increased in its severity, and the referee consulted the linesman, but still an attempt was made to finish the game, but with 10 minutes to go, after consulting both sides, the referee stopped the match, the score at that time reading
