## Match Reports

### GRESLEY CHARITY CUP

#### SEMI-FINAL

#### GRESLEY ROVERS v SWADLINCOTE

Played at Gresley. In dull weather before a big gate. Swadlincote opened best, and Jones scored from a penalty, but Fearn equalised immediately, the interval being one goal each. The Rovers' custodian was brilliant. In the second half Fearn again scored for Gresley, and later Wileman made it two each. The closing exchanges were vigorous and exciting, both trying hard. ### A KEEN AND EXCITING MATCH

was witnessed on the Grosley Rovers' enclosure on Saturday afternoon. The teams engaged in the semi-final were Burton Swifts Reserve and Stanton. In the Swifts Reserves Lloyd and Bell were absentees, and A. N. Other turned out to be Peach. The services of W. May and "Bag 'Em" West were requisitioned. It was early evident that both sides were in good form, and it was no certainty for the young Swallows. Hardwick did a lot of useful work. His outside man, Staley, worked hard, and with "S Wallow" made a good wing. When the Stantonians were leading by two goals, Jos. Parker was prominent in a raid into the Swifts quarters and scored, but to the disgust of the spectators Referee Lowles (Derby) disallowed the point, and some uncomplimentary and even unprintable things were said in Derbyshire dialect.

Stanton gave a capital exposition, and ought to have had four goals to their credit. Of the forwards, Shreeves, Hardwick, and Staley were well to the fore. In the second half a transformation scene took place. The Swifts Reserves attacked strongly, and the Stanton backs and half-backs did not come up to their general standard when hard pressed. The Burtonians have a splendid knack of putting in corners. Both their goals resulted from the ball being dropped accurately in the goal mouth from the corner flag. Had Wheatley kept in his goal he might have saved the first. He misjudged the ball, however, and the Burtonians opened their account. The Swifts' Parker made some capital attempts to put the Reserve on even terms, and ultimately succeeded in notching the equalizing goal from a corner. T. Lowe played a splendid game at back, and Roberts was safe. "Bag 'Em" West worked like an old war-horse. Warren played a judicious game. In Knibbs he had a capital partner.

### SWADLINCOTE ENTER THE FINAL.

The replayed semi-final for the Gresley Charity Cup took place on Friday morning on the Gresley Recreation Ground between Gresley Rovers and Swadlincote Town. Nearly 2,000 spectators were present to brave the elements and one of the most interesting matches of the season was witnessed. The teams faced each other in the following order:—

Gresley Rovers.—Goal, Newbould; backs, G. Jones and A. Adams; half-backs, Solomon, Fearn, and Richards; forwards, Ward, Harrison, Yardley, Wileman, and J. Jones.

Swadlincote.—Goal, Champion; backs, Sabine and Kinston; half-backs, Rowland, Alf. Jones, and Pickering; forwards, Draycott, Orgill, Chamberlain, Scott, and Wileman.

The Rovers, who kicked off, had to face a slight breeze, and the possession of the ball was early contested in Gresley quarters, Swadlincote making nothing of a corner. Draycott was the first to try his hand at shooting for goal, but he failed. Gresley then commenced an onslaught on the visitors' goal, but Sabine transferred. Draycott had another try to open the scoring sheet, and shot in, but he was ruled offside. Pickering nearly scored with a fine mid-field shot. A splendid shot from Alf. Jones just alighted on the top of the crossbar. Ward fell down through the slippery state of the ground, thus losing an easy opening. A sharp scrimmage ensued in front of the Swadlincote goal. Champion saved one or two shots in splendid style, but was eventually beaten by one from J. Jones, amid cheers. At half-time the score stood:—

In the second half Swadlincote showed their superior staying powers. Ward, especially, repeatedly broke away, but all their efforts came to grief. Eighteen minutes before time Scott drew the score level, Newbould being defeated in the course of a sharp melee. The Swadlincote goal had a somewhat narrow escape, but Champion managed to avert the danger. Swadlincote continued to have the best of the play, and eight minutes before time the home defence was again pierced, amidst tremendous enthusiasm. The last few minutes of the game were marked by a desperate effort on the part of the homesters to turn the tables, but without avail, and the Swaddies ran out winners. The final score was:—
